What is Aeration Anyway?

Over the summer months, as Members travel through the Front Gate, they often ask why one of the golf courses is brown. Our answer – aeration. But what does that actually mean?

Aeration is what we call a necessary evil. Golfers dislike aeration because it makes for less than desirable playing conditions. Golf Course Superintendents dislike aeration due to the high potential of damaging turf. We all love to see our courses in wonderful shape with vast arrays of green lush turfgrass and our putting surfaces firm, fast and true. However, in order to achieve the excellent playing conditions our Members are accustomed to, the soil has to be cultivated on a regular basis. During the summer months, our Golf Course Maintenance Team works diligently in extreme weather conditions to ensure that during the cooler months, playing conditions are ideal for the enjoyment of our Members.

How does aeration translate into excellence? In truth, core aeration is only a small part of the cultivation practices we have in place for our summer programs. Vertical mowing, fraze mowing, dry-jecting, scalp mowing, and top-dressing are all extraordinarily important as well.

Core aeration is the process of removing cores from the playing surface at a depth that breaks through the stain layer. Stain



Emergency Call Boxes Installed on Buccaneer Island

Last month, the Club made efforts to make Buccaneer Island an even safer place for Members and their families to enjoy.

Previously, a handheld phone located by the Pool Desk was used in the case of an emergency. In an effort to create greater widespread communication across Buccaneer Island, that phone has since been removed and replaced with five brand new emergency call boxes designated throughout the pool and beach areas.

These new boxes are an increasingly more reliable and accessible resource when faced with an emergency. They run on multiple cell service bands, are monitored 24/7 with a live emergency services dispatcher, and have a backup battery built in.

Whenever help is needed, the requester will push the button in the middle of the




One of five emergency call boxes stationed on Buccaneer Island.

box, located under "PUSH TO CALL", and emergency services will be contacted immediately. Once the button is pushed and the emergency phone is activated, detailed location information will be relayed to Public Safety so EMS knows the exact location to respond to the emergency.

You can find emergency call boxes installed in the following locations:

- 1. Pool Desk
- 2. Snapper Pool by ice machine
- 3. The Point
- 4. Beach Activities Hut
- 5. Marlin Beach by ice machine

Golf Cart Safety & Fire Prevention

The 2020 Census reported more than 3,900 golf carts at Ocean Reef and there's no question why carts are Members' favorite mode of Club transportation. Nevertheless, following a recent golf cart fire at The Reef, the Ocean Reef Press spoke with the Club's experts – Israel Salgado, Director of Cart Repair, Solid Waste & Service Station, and Brian Horne, Cart Repair & Cart Sales Manager – to find out what steps Members can take to prevent future incidents.

What causes a golf cart fire?

- The most common cause of a golf cart fire is improper battery maintenance and corrosion between battery terminals and cable connectors.
- •Another cause is charging carts in an area without ventilation. The fumes emitted by the battery when charging are flammable and

when ventilation is not available, any spark can ignite a flame.

What preventative measures can be taken to avoid cart induced fires?

- •Check often to ensure all cables and connectors are clean and tight, and frequently apply a thin coating of non-metallic grease or protective spray to ward off corrosion. These products are available for purchase at Cart Repair, or if you bring your cart in for maintenance, the Team can apply the products for you.
- •Frayed or worn-out cable connectors should be replaced.
- •Follow the cart manufacturer's charging recommendations and use the charger provided by the manufacturer.
- •Charging your golf cart in a well-ventilated area. If you're charging your cart in a cart room or garage, open a door or window to allow more air flow. Otherwise, charge the cart outside.
- •Maintain the health of your golf cart batteries through proper care.

What can Members do to maintain the health and longevity of their golf cart batteries?

- •Charge your cart overnight, even if it was only used for a few minutes. Most golf carts are equipped with an automatic shut-off feature that will stop the charging once the batteries are fully charged, so you shouldn't have to worry about letting the cart charge too long.
- •Water your batteries, check water levels regularly, and refill when needed. If you are unsure how to do this, stop by Cart Repair for a complimentary battery and tire check.
- •Generally, water must be added to golf cart batteries about every 30 days. This is governed by the amount of use a golf cart receives, its charging practices, and the amount of heat exposure. Remove vent caps, located below the seat of the golf cart, at least every few weeks to check and see if batteries are in need of water.
- batteries are in need of water.

 Only fill golf cart batteries
 with distilled water following a
 charge and do not over fill. A ring
 around the neck of the battery
 cell indicates water limit. You can
 also ask Cart Repair about adding
 a battery care system to make

water filling easy and safe.

What signs indicate a golf cart may be in need of maintenance?

•If your cart's battery is not holding a charge or the cart is not reaching the speed it should, it's time to take it to Cart Repair for an evaluation.

If a Member is leaving their cart for an extended period of time, what should they do?

- •Charge the cart fully the night before leaving and then unplug the cable from both the cart and the home/charging station.
- •Switch the golf cart out of "run" mode and into "tow" mode.
- •Check water levels in the batteries and fill with distilled water if needed.
- •If able, have someone check on the golf cart periodically until the Member's return.

The Fourth of July — Solemn Gladness

In conversation with a British friend, I once asked, rather lamely, "Do you have the fourth of July in England?" With English sensibility and typical wit, he replied, "No, we go straight from the third to the fifth!"

Nothing captures the spirit of Americana quite like our Independence Day Celebration on the Fourth of July. This national holiday commemorates the passage of the Declaration of Independence by the Second Continental Congress on July 4, 1776.

Memories of the holiday recall fun-filled outings and parades lining the streets, all set to the sounds of John Philip Sousa's "Stars and Stripes Forever."

However, the bright sound and brash optimism of Sousa's march seem out of sync on this, our nation's 246th anniversary. The reasons seem obvious.

We are embroiled in bitter civic strife, seemingly having forgotten, or deliberately ignoring, the brilliance of our founders. They wisely established a principle of government, a system of check and balance, under which separate branches are empowered to limit actions by other branches and are induced to share power.

We are a nation with a track record of innovation and determination, accustomed to abundance and prosperity. Yet we are facing the once unthinkable reality of shortages, and the rise of debilitating inflation not experienced in

almost four decades.

The backbone of our nation, our educational system, has become polarized and politicized. School names, many of which once recalled prominent leaders from the past, now remind us of places where evil has destroyed precious lives, leaving death and grief in its wake.

The preamble to our Constitution aspires toward the goal of forming a "more perfect Union," which will "establish Justice, (and) insure domestic Tranquility...."

Yet the present state of our union has devolved into a kind of civil war, with red and blue camps hurling invective like canon fire, labeling those whose views differ from their own as 'terrorists' and 'threats to our democracy.'

If I were to choose music appropriate to our national celebration this year, it would be Aaron Copeland's stirring work, "Fanfare for the Common Man." Composed in the early years of World War II, the opening bars of the score, the French horns and tympani, resonate with a sense of solemn gladness.

Solemnity seems an appropriate word to capture the emotional reality of our present moment. And gladness, a complex word, like wellaged wine, has hints and deep undertones and colors associated with joy.

We are all familiar with the unstated rule of cocktail parties. Two topics are always unwelcome – politics and religion. Perhaps it's a sane rule, like not drinking and driving. Over-imbibing never seems to bring out the best in anyone!

Please forgive me in advance for comparing Ocean Reef to a 'petri dish.' But please hear me

Can you imagine a better community anywhere than Ocean Reef, where civic discourse could take place, in a rational and respectful context? What form, what forum might be created in which divergent views could be exchanged, and

consequences considered, as a deeply needed and positive, contagious model? Something to think about?

Now, at the heart of Ocean Reef, stands the new Chapel and Fellowship Center. This is a place where the solemn gladness of rich, historic Christian and Jewish faith, is expressed and experienced on a weekly basis. Religious conversation is welcomed here!

On this 246th celebration of our Independence, it is good to be reminded that the founders of our nation shared a common belief upon which our nation was founded. It is captured in the words of a Psalm, "Blessed is the nation whose God is the Lord."

We invite you to join us, this **Sunday**, **July 3**, at 10 a.m., in the sanctuary of the chapel, for a worship celebration full of solemn gladness.

You don't have to be dressed up to be welcomed! Come as you are, and join us as we give thanks to God for our nation, and together acknowledge our need of, and dependence upon our God, as the ultimate source of confident hope for our future.



Bill and Barbara founded Red Coats, Inc. in 1960 and worked





ORPAC Voting Recommendations

This is a lot of information to get through...thanking you in advance for your time. Your vote is important.

With your help, the Ocean Reef Political Action Committee (ORPAC) has made great strides in having our voice heard throughout the Keys over the last 30 plus years on issues that matter to our Ocean Reef community. While the focus remains on maintaining good relationships with our Monroe County elected officials, our attention has expanded to include a broader Miami Dade County and state-wide approach as we address large issues affecting our community. Card Sound Road safety and the environmental impact of a proposed Homestead Air Reserve Base civil air expansion are just two examples. With that said, we are fast approaching the 2022 election cycle primaries.

In Monroe County, three incumbent County Commissioners -- Michelle Coldiron, David Rice, and Jim Scholl -- were recently elected without opposition as the final day for candidates to qualify passed, and officials who ran unopposed were declared winners. Commissioner Holly Raschein will face fellow Republican Jose Peixoto in the August primary. Governor DeSantis appointed Raschein last fall following the death of County Commissioner Mike Forster. We strongly recommend you cast your vote for Raschein. Along with sitting Commissioner Craig Cates, these five make up a strong, capable team for our County. Non-partisan races, such as MC School Board, will be decided in the Primary and, if needed,

a run-off election for those sets would be held Nov. 8.

As a result of the once a decade redistricting process, our State Senator Ana Maria Rodriguez was also up for re-election and was elected without opposition.

In Miami-Dade, Micky
Steinberg was elected
without opposition to fill the
District 4 seat which covers
13 coastal cities including
Miami Beach. She takes that
seat in November. For our
Members who reside and vote
in Miami-Dade, it is critically
important that you support
candidates who promote
policies that positively impact
our community. You'll find our
strong recommendations below.

Important!! Please keep in mind that our Precinct 33 polling location was recently changed by Monroe County Supervisor of Elections, The Honorable Joyce Griffin, from The Academy at Ocean Reef to the Florida Keys Community College, 106040 Overseas Highway, Key Largo. The change was made without any communication to anyone at Ocean Reef prior to the decision. A number of us have reached out to Ms. Griffin. No promises can be made at this time—but we'll do all we can to try and reverse the decision by the 2024 voting cycle.


The last day to register to vote in Monroe County before Primary elections is July 25, 8 a.m. – 5 p.m. If you are not able to vote in person for either the August 23 primary or the November 8 election, and plan to do so

by Mail-In Ballot, note the deadline to request that vote-by-mail ballot be mailed to you is no later than 5 p.m. on the 10th day before the election. That means August 13 for the Primaries. I suggest you do it now to allow yourself plenty of time. We'll get the sample Monroe County ballot to you once published, late July.

You can call the Monroe County Supervisor of Elections office at 305-292-3416, email info@keys-elections.org, or make your request online at keys-elections.org. If you make the request online, you may be asked to print, sign and mail them an Affidavit verifying your request of address. Follow up with a phone call to see if they can waive the need for the signed Affidavit. If you have made a prior request to the same non-Florida address, they may be able to do it. Your mail-in ballot must be received by the Supervisor of Elections' Office no later than 7 p.m. on Election Day.

For those members voting in the Miami Dade County elections, the Primary and General Election dates remain the same, 8/23 and 11/8 respectively. Go to "Voter Registration – Miami Dade County" in your search engine. There you will see options to find your polling location, request Mail-in ballot, etc. The Elections Office phone number is 305-499-8683 or email register@miamidade.gov.

July 4, 1922 – Our Own 100-Year-Old Firecracker Baby

Born in 1922, Doreen Adrienne McConnell was the eldest of 3 girls. Her dad was Navy Vice Admiral Robert P. McConnell, and her mom, Mildred, a devoted dog lover. Over the years, Doreen and her family moved many times, even to the Philippines for a short stint before the war broke out in 1940.

In 1938 with her mom and two sisters, 16-year-old Doreen made a boat trip with a friend, Chet Cross, from Palm Island to Angler's Club.

Doreen met Edward Beverly Johnson, Jr., Captain in the United States Navy, when he pulled up at her house in a baby blue Ford convertible with his buddy, who had a date with Doreen's sister Millie. The buddy needed a ride from Ed, and Ed was eager to accommodate. Doreen took one look at the car, and she asked Ed to take her for "a spin." Ever the accommodating gentleman, Ed obliged, and within that "spin" a lifelong love affair was born.

After their marriage in 1944, the travel began. The Johnsons lived in a Quonset hut in Annapolis, Maryland, Florida, Rhode Island, Virginia, Whidbey Island, Guam, Okinawa, Alabama, Ohio, to name a few.

How did the Johnsons come to Ocean Reef?

Many years later in 1985, Ed and Doreen were coming back from the Bahamas in their 39 ft. boat when they passed Ocean Reef. They stopped off to see about this enchanted island, fell in love once again, and decided to buy a home. They settled on the little house at 1 Country Club Road, and Doreen has remained there ever since, which was 37 years ago. Her beloved husband, Ed, died October 27, 2015.


Along the way, they had three children. **Beverly** was born in 1947, and was an adventurer and a much-celebrated female rock climber. She was the first woman to solo climb notorious El Capitan's vertical face, which took 10 days in 1980. She was the foremost woman climber in the United States. Tragically, she was killed in 1994 in a helicopter crash during a ski trip in Nevada.

Ted was born in 1949 in Minneapolis, Minnesota, and is married to his lovely wife, Chris Rifenburgh. Avid boaters Ted, Randy and their dad had many adventures. Chris and Ted have 3 children Brett, Casey and Carly and live in Virginia. Many years later in 1963,

Many years later in 1963, Robert Andrew Johnson, nicknamed **Randy** joined the family. Randy is now retired from a construction company in Arlington, Virginia. Randy and his wife, Gwen split their time between Virginia and Florida.

Looking back on the last 100 years, I asked Doreen if she had any regrets. She replied, "I can't think of any. I have had a great life. I am lucky to have found the right guy, had a lovely family with 3 grandkids to boot, and we played tennis, golf, skied, boated, played bridge, and sure traveled a lot."

And as for her upcoming birthday, she said, "I think my family has something planned for my 100th birthday on July 4, 2022, but I believe it is a secret! I love a good surprise!"

This year we have worked hard to continue our projects on making the world a better place by trying our best to reduce trash and collect ocean debris. Trash in the ocean can be harmful to animals. This year we distributed 13 monofilament containers for collecting and recycling fishing line, four of them are being used at Ocean Reef Club to help keep trash out of the ocean.



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
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Summer Camp Update & Meet the Team




playing surface at a depth that breaks through the stain layer. Stain layer is soil below the surface that is darker in color due to the buildup of organics. This layer inhibits the movement of water and oxygen. Core aeration also relieves the soil of compaction by creating space within the profile for soil to move slightly. Once the surface is cleaned of debris, the holes are filled with sand, which allows the surface to drain through the stain layer and into the original USGA greens mix.

Vertical mowing is exactly what it sounds like. It is a mower that incorporates vertical blades instead of horizontal. Vertical mowing helps open up the canopy and removes excess thatch. Thatch is the decaying organics and forms as a natural process. The thatch layer is the area which disease forms most readily. Excess thatch also creates a spongy surface leading to playability issues. Vertical mowing is also an integral part of grain management.

Fraze mowing, in the simplest of terms, is a modified version of sod cutting. The difference is a fraze mowing unit utilizes multiple blades and is much safer than simply using a sod cutter. We only fraze mow our collars at this point to help eliminate thatch and collar damning. Collar damning is an area of the collar that is raised above the green causing a disruption in surface draining, the process by which water naturally flows from the green surface in to the draining areas around the green.

Dry-ject is a specialized piece of equipment that uses extremely high pressured water to piece the green surface and then injects sand directly into the hole. It can only be used as a supplement to core aeration as it does not aid with reduction of compaction.

Scalp mowing is the act of mowing at least half of the leaf tissue from the fairways, tees and roughs. Scalp mowing is beneficial as it helps rid

areas of puffiness which also provides for a firmer playing surface. Scalp mowing also gets rid of old leaf tissue allowing space for new leaves to thrive.

Top-dressing is the incorporation of sand into the playing surface. Sand is a key component in keeping our playing conditions firm, fast and true. Sand is a crucial element in thatch reduction and enlarged pore space within the soil profile. During the summer we sand top-dress heavy to fill in holes and lines created by core aeration and vertical mowing. However, we continue to lightly top-dress throughout the entire year to try and dilute the thatch layer as much as possible.

The combination of these processes allows us to provide conditions in which we and our Membership can be proud. If you happen to see members of maintenance staff, please feel free to approach and say hello. Our associates work extremely hard in extremely hot and sometimes rainy conditions. The images show the extent of how heavy our cultivation practices are and how quickly the playing conditions return to great. The images of the current aeration are of the Dolphin which is taking place now. The other images are of the Hammock which we closed for 6 weeks and is now back to great summer playing conditions.







Habits that Build Summer Bodies

A summer body is a concept which represents the desire to achieve optimal aesthetic results. In fitness there are different strategies and tactics such training methodologies, programs, diets and recovery techniques to help us achieve optimal aesthetics and other important goals such as improvements in health and performance. To greatly increase our chances of success, we must form habits rather than solely relying on motivation and drive. Habits are formed with consistency, focus and repetition. Here are some positive habits that lead to better fitness, wellness and an overall improvement in lifestyle:

- Have an easier workout on days that you are not feeling motivated or are low in energy rather than skipping sessions. We all know that consistency is key to success. Easier workouts are far superior than no workouts. Dial down but do not lose momentum.



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BRIDGE TIP

Bidding With Interference

By Gregg Van Dyke, Director of Card & Games

Bidding would be a lot easier if the opponents did not interfere. But we know this is not the case. Here are some guidelines when the opponents get in our way:

After a Suit Overcall Suit Responses

If your partner opens and the next opponent overcalls in a suit then 2/1 Game Forcing (including 1NT Forcing) are OFF. We now revert to Standard Bidding:

-New suit at the 1-level promises 4 pieces (6+ points).

-New suit at the 2-level promises 5 pieces (10+

points).

-1NT would show a balanced hand with 6-10 HCPs (with stoppers in the opponent's suit)

-Raise in partner's suit would show 3 card support and 7-10 points

-Double raise in partner's suit would show 4 card support and 6-9 points

-Triple raise in partner's suit would show 5 card support and 6-9 points.

-Cue Bid would show a Limit Raise (11-12) or Better

Examples:

West North East South

1♣ 1♦ 1♠ = 4 spades and 6+ points

1♣ 1♦ 1NT = 6-10 HCPs with diamonds stoppers (no 4-card major)

1♠ 2♦ 2♥ = 5 hearts and 10+ points (forcing)

♦ 2**♦** 2**♦** = 3 spades

and 7-10 points (non-forcing) $1 \triangleq 2 \implies 3 \triangleq 4 \text{ spades}$ and 6-9 points (non-forcing) $1 \triangleq 2 \implies 4 \triangleq 5 \text{ spades}$ and 6-9 points (non-forcing)

Negative Doubles

Don't forget about Negative Doubles!

West North East South

1♣ 1♥ Double = Shows 4 Spades

West North East South

1♣ 1♥ 1♠ = Shows 5 Spades West North East South

1♣ 1♠ Double = Shows

4 Hearts

West North East South

1♣ 1♦ Double = Shows 4
Hearts AND 4 Spades
West North East South

1♥ 1♠ Double = Shows 4 Clubs AND 4 Diamonds

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







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
