Get Ready to Rock the Block! Neighborhood Party How-To

We're just over one month away from the Burgee Jubilee, **April 13 to 16**, commemorating Ocean Reef's anniversary celebration of 75 years as a Club and 30 years Member owned. For

the full weekend schedule, you can visit oceanreef.com/AnniversaryWeekend, but this week, the Ocean Reef Press walks you through Thursday's Rock the Block Parties.

The concept for Rock the Block was born out of the original 1993 buyout celebration when "a series of cocktail parties held in the different neighborhoods kicked off the celebration, followed by a mile-long parade in which every

Rules Reminder: The "Two Visit Rule"

A longstanding rule set in place to ensure membership in Ocean Reef Club would always be a privilege, is the "Two Visit Rule." Below is the explanation as written in the Club's Rules & Regulations. For the full set of Rules & Regulations, please visit oceanreef.com/rules.

1. No person, other than a house guest, or child of a Club member, as set forth herein in the sections entitled "Guests" and "Children," shall be permitted to visit the Club more than two times in any five year period, with each visit to be limited to a maximum of 14 days, without becoming a member of the Club. This shall be known as the "two visit rule."
2. The two visit rule will apply to guests staying in rooms at the Inn, other than sponsored group attendees, as well as to boat owners using the Club's marina.
3. The two visit rule will apply to those clubs granted reciprocity or other affiliation with the Club.

When the two visit rule applies to boats and yachts, the owner of the vessel will be registered as the visitor. All guests on board the vessel will also be registered as guests of the Club if operationally feasible to do so.

Gotta Question?

I have grandchildren visiting for spring break this month and they are anxious to drive our golf carts. How old do you have to be to get your golf cart license?



Children age 10 and older are eligible for a learner's permit. They must be at least 4'9" tall and sponsored by a family member who is a Club Member. The child must pass a written test and are given a demonstration on how to properly turn and merge into traffic lanes by ORCA Public Safety. Upon passing, they may only drive when accompanied by a licensed driver at least 18 years old and must at all times display the license on a colored lanyard provided by ORCA Public Safety.

To qualify for a golf cart

license you must be at least 12 years of age and licensed either through ORCA Public Safety or possess a valid state driver license. You must hold a learner's permit for 12 months prior to receiving your golf cart license regardless of age.

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option to garner as much or as little help from the Club as desired.

For the purpose of Rock the Block, the Club has categorized Ocean Reef into several different zones, or neighborhoods, in an effort to bring Members from multiple communities together.

Notices have been sent out to the corresponding Advisory Council members to get the ball rolling on planning. Here is all you need to know about the Burgee Jubilee Rock the Block Parties:

- Each neighborhood may elect to host their Block Party on a different date and/or time than the official date of Thursday, April 13.

- Information regarding the planning of the parties has been sent to the Advisory Council members for each neighborhood. While any resident is welcome to volunteer to take lead in the planning, please contact your Advisory Council member first (see list below).

- The Club can provide four levels of involvement:
 - Option 1: No contribution.

- Option 2: The Club provides all tables, chairs and linens at no cost. The rest, most commonly a potluck, is left up to the neighborhood.

- Option 3: The Club provides all tables, chairs and linens at no cost. A Club beverage option is available for a fee and the neighborhood supplies the food.

- Option 4: The Club does everything, including tables, chairs and linens at no cost, and food and beverage options, speakers and more for a fee.

- Regardless of the option chosen, the Club will deliver and pick up the tables, chairs and linens for no cost to the

neighborhood.

- Each individual community may elect to host a resident-only Block Party.

- Participation is voluntary and at each neighborhood's discretion. If your neighborhood would prefer to opt out, please advise the Member Events Team.

To get started with planning your party, the first step is to reach out to your neighbors and see how many would like to participate, in addition to selecting a date, time, and location. Once you have these details, please contact the Member Events Team at 305-367-5874 to secure your needs.

Several neighborhoods have already locked in their Rock the Block Party plans. At press time, these include Angelfish Cay homes, the Marina (Docks A-H), Villa Cay, and Sunrise Cay. These communities have elected to host a potluck-style party, with each resident contributing one item (either food or beverage), and the Club providing the tables, chairs and linens.

Additionally, the following neighborhoods have begun their planning at press time: Bay Ridge/Knoll Lane Area, Halfway/Grayvik Road Area, Snapper Point, Card Sound Road Area, Angelfish Cay Condos, Pumpkin Cay Condos, Sunset Cay Road, 121 Marina, and Harbor Links.

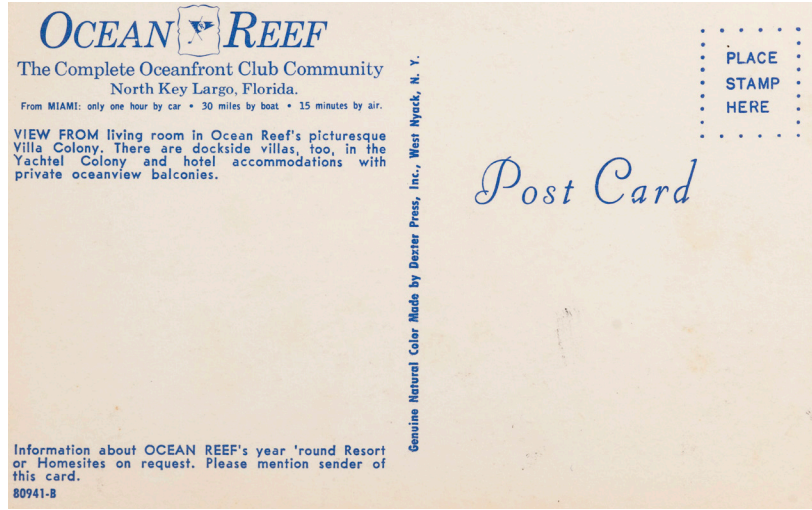

According to *On The Reef*, "The Villa Colony was formed primarily by hydraulic fill as there were not really any channels to produce the fill... The villas were modest. The basic lot was 10,000 square feet. Some people bought them and put them in the rental pool. Other people bought them and used them."

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38th Annual Reef Cup

Watch the Fleet Return
March 16 – 18

Since the tradition began in 1986 with 24 participants squaring off for three days of serious sailfishing and nightly celebration, the Reef Cup Invitational Sailfish Tournament has become The Reef's most anticipated fishing tournament of the season. Thirty-eight years later, the tournament is capped at a 60-boat fleet and has been held every year, rain or shine, since the inaugural tournament. Reef Cup Committee member **Ken Reda** describes the tournament as "amongst the oldest time-honored events we host here at the Club."

With a waitlist steadily maintained for years, it's

safe to say the Reef Cup tournament is widely regarded as The Reef's most popular fishing tournament. Competition in the 2023 Reef Cup Invitational Sailfish Tournament begins **Wednesday, March 15** with a captain's meeting, welcome party and dinner, followed by three days of fishing. Live results can be followed by visiting oceanreef.com/reefcupresults and Members can welcome anglers home from The Point daily at 4 p.m.

CARD SOUND ROAD CLOSURE SUNDAY

Card Sound Road will be closed to vehicular traffic in both directions from 7 a.m. to 1 p.m. on **Sunday, March 12th**. An endurance triathlon (called CLASH Endurance) will commence at Homestead Miami Speedway. This endurance race involves a 56-mile bike ride and will impact your travel if you plan to drive to or leave ORC that day.

The bike course will be on Palm Avenue in Homestead, US 1 Northbound in Florida City and Card Sound Road and will impact roads in the following ways:

- Card Sound Road will be closed to vehicular traffic in both directions from 7 a.m. to 1 p.m.
- US 1 (northbound) 2 northbound lanes will be occupied by cyclists and one northbound lane will remain open to vehicular traffic.
- Palm Avenue: Riders will occupy the eastbound lane (traveling westbound to US 1). On the return, bikes will be traveling eastbound to return to Homestead Miami Speedway. Palm Avenue will remain open to westbound and eastbound vehicular traffic. For specific questions regarding this event, please email info@clash-usa.com.

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Moving Into Uncharted Waters

An update on my quest to become a better-rounded fish eater – I have always liked unusual continental dishes that make **Fair Patricia** cringe: calamari, escargot, octopus, and sweetbreads. I even thought I was hip indulging in sushi. For many years I have enjoyed Melanie Rolls at Ocean Reef. I thought this made me modern and sophisticated, but of course, every rookie can enjoy the Melanie Roll. I never really branched out into other sushi or sashimi. I thought I wouldn't like raw fish. That is until Chef Eric Andreu seduced me into trying his new Seared Pacific Bluefin Tataki at the Sushi Bar. It is just wonderful, a jolt of the sea, black garlic soy, thinly sliced Bluefin Tuna, scallions, and a combination of exotic aromas. I was dragged a step closer to exploring thinly sliced raw fish (Sashimi) or Nigiri (bite-sized fish over rice).

Eric told me about the new Omakase Menu (Chef's Choice) he designed for the Ocean Room. This week I courageously put myself in the able hands of Sushi Chef Kimmi Gray (Eric's star pupil) to experience the five course Ocean Room Omakase Menu. Chef Kimmi prepared the items one-at-a-time, and brought each to the table to explain what I was eating and answer any questions. What a relaxing and civilized presentation.

My dinner started with Sweet Ebi Nigiri (shrimp, cleaned, trimmed, and cooked

butterflied)(so no raw fish yet). The shrimp was formed over bite-sized rice balls, accompanied by White Shoyu (soy sauce) and scallions. Traditional finger food dipped in the sauce and savored. The next course was Hogfish & Passionfruit Ceviche, with Sweet Peppers and Coconut Foam. I haven't liked Ceviche in the past because I don't care for the bitter citrus used to firm up the raw fish. But the Passionfruit, sweet peppers and coconut created an aromatic sweet essence. It was a revelation. Next came Bluefin Tataki, which I have already described, but this had the addition of Bowfin Caviar and squid ink crisps. Yikes.

Just as an example of the intricate steps to prepare each element, consider the squid ink. Chef Kimmi cooks a pudding of tapioca and squid ink, then spreads it in a thin layer on a baking sheet. From there it rests overnight in a dehydrating oven. In the morning, it looks like a sheet of blue corn chips. She breaks these up and fries them until they puff up light as air – all of this for a *garnish*.

Next was a beautiful Salmon Sashimi with Ikura (salmon roe), Mojo Aioli, cured egg, and scallions. A completely different set of tastes, unique and delightful. Finally, Toro (the most-prized cut of a Bluefin Tuna), served with Bamboo Sticky Rice and Shiso (a Japanese mint like herb). It

is hard not to gush; the Toro melts in your mouth. I started the evening thinking I might have to grin-and-bear some unhappy combinations, but I sat back at the end thoroughly enchanted. The Omakase Menu is offered Tuesday nights at the Ocean Room. The menu changes every week depending on the fish that can be flown fresh from Japan.

Short Takes

- A new menu item of crab cakes was offered as a special last week at the Ocean Room. Delicious. They were such a hit, the crab cakes have been added to the Reef Lounge menu starting Monday.
- One night I looked for some greens on the Reef Lounge menu (health is my middle name). But I noticed the strange description for the OR Caesar: hearts of romaine (OK so far), then cashew "parmesan," hemp seed, lemon-cashew dressing, crispy chickpeas...what? Eventually the light bulb came on. It was a *Vegan Caesar*. The chefs cleverly replaced all of the animal products -- eggs, anchovies, cheese, and bread croutons with vegan substitutes. 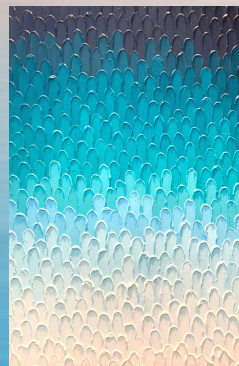

Can the Good Way Be Found?

Many years ago, the Hebrew prophet Jeremiah spoke to the Israelite nation during a period of political upheaval, facing a foreboding future. He challenged them saying, "Stand at the crossroads and look; ask for the ancient paths, ask where the good way is, and walk in it, and you will find rest for your souls."

Os Guinness is our guest speaker in the Protestant Congregation this Sunday. He is an important author and social critic who has taken his stand at the contemporary cultural crossroads we are facing today, both nationally and globally. He has been asking where the good way is to be found that we might walk in it.

Great-great-great grandson of Arthur Guinness, the Dublin brewer, he was born in China in World War II where his parents were medical missionaries. A witness to the climax of the Chinese revolution in 1949, he was expelled with many other foreigners in 1951 and returned to Europe where he was educated in England. He completed his undergraduate degree at the University of London and his D.Phil in the social sciences from Oriel College, Oxford. Os has written or edited more than 30 books.

Since moving to the United States in 1984, he has been a Guest Scholar at the Woodrow Wilson Center for International Studies, a Guest Scholar and Visiting Fellow at the Brookings Institution, and Senior Fellow at the Trinity Forum and the EastWest Institute in New York. He was the lead drafter of the Williamsburg Charter in 1988, a celebration of the bicentennial of the US Constitution, and

later of "The Global Charter of Conscience," which was published at the European Union Parliament in 2012. Os has spoken at many of the world's major universities and spoken widely to political and business conferences across the world.

In his speaking and writing, he presents a prescient analysis of what he sees as a thoughtful person of faith and trained social scientist looking at our cultural crossroads today.

As an admirer of our country, albeit an outsider, he says, "The American Republic is suffering its greatest crisis since the Civil War. Conflicts, hostility, and incivility now threaten to tear the country apart. Competing visions have led to a dangerous moment of cultural self-destruction. This is no longer politics as usual, but an era of political warfare where our enemies are not foreign adversaries, but our fellow citizens."

As one who has traveled extensively and probed deeply, he sees the great over-arching problem confronting us globally. He says, "The world finds itself torn between the two great bookends of human history - authoritarianism and anarchy. Authoritarianism is the world of order and stability without freedom. Anarchy is the world of freedom without order and stability."

"The present challenge," he says, "is to establish genuine personal freedom and substantially free societies in a generation that pays lip service to freedom while all the time it is pulled toward one or other

of the extremes - which like all extremes, grow to resemble and reinforce each other at the point of their extremism."

He writes, "*Humanity now faces a simple but urgent question that must be answered in the coming generation: Is it still possible in the advanced modern world to build societies with both freedom and order at the same time? Is it still possible to build and sustain communities and nations that demonstrate the highest values of human dignity, freedom, justice, equality, compassion, peace and stability?*"

In his book, "The Magna Carta of Humanity: Sinai's Revolutionary Faith and The Future of Freedom," Os explores the ancient path found in The Book of Exodus and the

first five books of the Hebrew Scriptures. He points to them as being the "good way" - nothing less than the Magna Carta of humanity. He believes Sinai offers the deepest and most comprehensive foundations of human freedom ever to ring out over the landscape of humanity. He contends that this offers the good way that we can and must walk in.

Os has been called "a quiet voice on behalf of faith, freedom, truth, reason, and civility." We encourage you to come and hear what this "quiet voice" will have to say to us this **Sunday at 9 a.m. in the Ocean Reef Chapel and Fellowship Center.**

Dr. Ralph Nurnberger, a nationally-recognized political scientist, historian, educator and foreign policy expert from Washington, D.C., is a fascinating and entertaining speaker who brings political insights, historical facts, and humor to a wide range of topics. A Professor at Georgetown University for almost 4 decades, Dr. Nurnberger was a lobbyist at the American Israel Public Affairs Committee (AIPAC) during the 80's and 90's, when it was widely considered the most powerful lobbying force in Washington, D.C., advocating for and building a strong and lasting US – Israel

relationship. Throughout his career as a Congressional and Executive branch staff, lobbyist, and educator, he has worked extensively with Israel and other international governments and global business leaders. He is a frequent presenter at the Smithsonian Institution, both in D.C. and on their International Journeys, as well as at universities and communities around the United States. He has spoken on political and international issues and is sought after for his expert analyses of political campaigns and matters under congressional or presidential consideration.

His featured remarks, "The Protocols of the Elders of Zion and the Current State of Global Antisemitism," are presented for the entire ORC community on **Sunday, March 19 at 5 p.m. in the Chapel.**

This presentation will examine the history of **The Protocols of the Elders of Zion and the Current State of Global Antisemitism**, recognized as the most significant anti-Semitic trope ever written. Dr. Nurnberger will delve into the mystery of who wrote the Protocols and why this document has served as a basis for modern Antisemitism around the world for over 100 years. He will speak about the current state and dangers of global Antisemitism and the importance of our maintaining a collective vigil. Q & A to follow the remarks.

As a beginning to the weekend, on **Friday, March 17 at 6 p.m. in the Chapel**, Dr. Nurnberger will speak about recent **Israeli Elections and Their Consequences**, following an abbreviated Shabbat Service. 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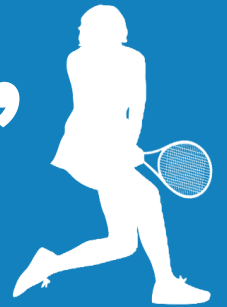

Medical Lecture Series Presents "Robotic Knee Surgery: Where We Are Today & Where We Are Going"



Please join us on **Tuesday, March 14th**, 5 p.m. at the Cultural Center Theatre for a presentation by Dr. Andrew D. Pearle on the latest technologies in knee surgery. He is a board-certified orthopedic surgeon specializing in sports medicine

and is Chief of Sports Medicine and Director of the Computer Assisted Surgery Center at Hospital for Special Surgery (HSS), New York, New York.

A graduate of Amherst College and Stanford Medical School, Dr. Andrew Pearle completed his training in orthopedic surgery and sports medicine at Hospital for Special

Surgery. After 9/11, during the height of the intifada in Jerusalem, he traveled to Hadassah Hospital to assist in the care of terror victims. While participating in this care, Dr. Pearle was inspired by the pioneering use of computer assisted surgery at Hadassah Hospital. "Hadassah surgeons modified computer assisted surgery tools designed for the spine, and applied the technology to remove shrapnel," he recalls.

Dr. Pearle was recruited as an attending orthopedic surgeon at HSS and was selected to develop one of the first computer assisted surgery programs in the United States. He has now performed more types of robotic and computer assisted procedures than any orthopedic surgeon in the country.

In addition to his responsibilities at HSS, Dr.

Pearle is an Associate Team Physician for the New York Mets and coordinates care for the minor league affiliates including the Brooklyn Cyclones. Dr. Pearle was voted Castle Connolly "America's Top Doctors, 2016-2020", Castle Connolly "Top Doctors in New York Metro Area, 2014-2022" and New York Magazine "Top Doctors, 2013-2022".

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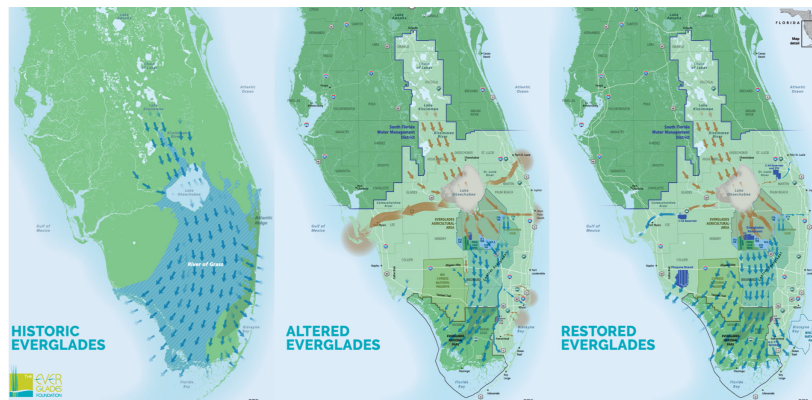
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Everglades Foundation Makes Annual Presentation

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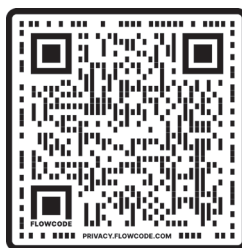

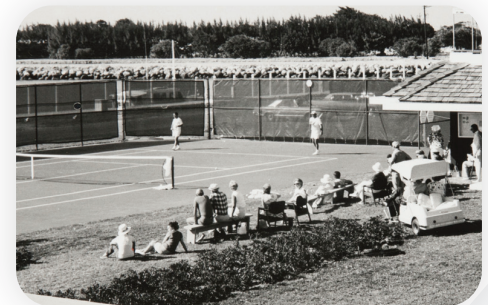

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Your Wake Defines You

A couple of years ago we motored by a private dock in the San Juan Islands. At the outer end a neatly lettered sign read: YOUR WAKE DEFINES YOU.

This surprisingly contemplative approach to limiting wake damage from passing vessels eclipsed all of the SLOW - NO WAKE signs seen everywhere boats meet confined water.

We wondered about the message posted on that dock. Was it more than a simple plea to slow down? Was it perhaps a metaphor for our lives? A measure of the effect on others that our actions and relationships leave in our biographical wake? We leave that for the

philosophers.

Ducks and boats create wakes. Powerboats create big wakes, and at speed can displace steep, fast and potentially dangerous waves. The US Coast Guard and State of Florida recognize this and regulate No Wake and Minimum Wake Zones as well as enforce rules.

The Rules are long established and clear about boat wakes: we, the vessel operators, are responsible for our wakes. Our wakes must not create a hazard to other vessels, cause damage or personal injury.

BoatUS Magazine published a sobering narrative about boat wake liability noting that "the courts read the word 'collision' to include both a collision with a vessel's hull and a collision with its wake."

We have, like many mariners, been chastised on occasion for our boat's wake via VHF, fist and finger, signals and shouts or bouts of fury. Messages like these are embarrassing, traumatic and often justified. Whenever our actions impose on bystanders or fellow boaters, the burden belongs to us.

The thrill of throttle up, headlong speed and expediency are alluring joys. Few captains relish idling around on big waters when you want to get someplace. We need to make wakes.

However, we might look behind us more often to gauge our wake, and to imagine how that wake defines us in the waters we share with others.

BOATING SAFETY TIP

Keeping boating fun does require active control by the vessel operator, and cooperation of the passengers and crew. In every Coast Guard Auxiliary mission, before we leave the dock, we review the key safety guidelines and equipment. The main precepts to guide us are repeated and practiced by all aboard.

These are:

- Safety
- Communications
- Situational Awareness

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Move Your Feet!



“Pickleball Tip” by Frankie Ngo, Pickleball Professional

Footwork and moving your feet are crucial to playing better pickleball. But, what exactly does this mean?

Generally speaking, moving your feet means positioning your lower body to be behind the pickleball, so that you can set up your shot from the ground up. In other words, by positioning yourself behind the pickleball you will strike the pickleball out in front of your body—which will help you hit the best shot possible. Plus, you will be able to generate more pace and power as well as more easily prepare for your next shot and stay as balanced as possible.

To put it more concretely, think of the following in order to move

your feet on the pickleball court:

- **Take small, balanced steps:** Rather than taking large strides, which can take significant time and be more difficult to change direction, take small, balanced steps. This will help you cut down on the time necessary to change direction, as well as make it easier to split step in between each shot (as a reminder, be sure to split step immediately prior to your opponents hitting the pickleball). However, take everything in moderation, including your small steps. There should not be any “Flashdance Maniacs” on the pickleball court, which could be less efficient and exhausting.
- **Stay on the balls of your feet:** Sometimes, pickleball players get caught flat-footed or even on their heels. This leads to slow, clunky feet with slow reaction time and poor weight transfer in your shots (as your body weight is not moving through your shot). To help avoid this, consciously make an effort to stay on the balls of your feet, which—like the small, balanced steps—will help you cut down on your reaction time, enable you to

pivot when needed, and help you hit better shots on the pickleball court.

- **Remain balanced:** Balance is crucial in quality footwork. Otherwise, you may just fall over. To help you remain balanced, have a sturdy base. In other words, keep your feet slightly wider than shoulder-width apart and keep your knees bent in an athletic stance. If you go too wide with your feet, you may have a tendency to get cemented to the ground, and it will otherwise be too difficult to move your feet. On the other hand, if you go too narrow, you will have less balance and be awkwardly upright, instead of in an athletic stance. So, remain balanced and keep those feet slightly wider than shoulder width.

- **Transfer your weight:** Use your footwork to help you generate power on your shots. To do this, transfer your weight from back to front (from the ground up) on your shots. Be sure to remain low in your athletic stance in order to keep your power concentrated behind the pickleball and avoid sailing the

pickleball out of bounds.

- **Find the proper court positioning:** Use your feet to put yourself in the best position on the pickleball court. For instance, follow the flight of the pickleball and move in tandem with your partner by staying linked with about 6 to 8 feet of space between the two of you. This will help you cover the most likely shots from your opponents, as well as reduce the angles of attack from your opponents.

- Be sure to take lateral steps at the Non-Volley Zone line (as opposed to crossover steps) in order to hold the line and enable yourself to quickly get ready for the next shot (as crossover steps are more difficult to recover from).

- On lobs, avoid backpedaling. Rather, drop step and move sideways back to hit the lob out of the air or otherwise retrieve the lob.

And, as noted above, split step! Don't forget to split step immediately prior to your opponents hitting the pickleball, which will enable you to better react to your opponent's shot.

The Florida Sailfish Cup tournament is a contest that runs from December thru May — each boat picks the 4 days that they will fish, and reports the 3 best days' results — and with 75 days of fishing left to go, it's too soon to tell who will win. But **Carmen Sferrazza's** Carma picked the right day for their first posting, and are in second place after a remarkably stellar day.

Captain **Tucker Ersek** of the Carma is a native son of the Keys, fishing since he was 8 years old and even though he is only 24 years old now, he has an affinity for the job

that is uncanny. He studies the conditions constantly to determine when and where to go. Sailfish are attracted to a specific combination of wind and currents, reportedly just before a cold front. He looks for the green water that Biscayne Bay dumps onto the edge of the reef. When this nutrient-rich water hits the north current of the Gulf Stream, it creates a natural boundary that holds baitfish and attracts sailfish, and when Tucker's study of currents, winds and temperature conditions indicate it's the right time to go, he makes the call. You may get notice at 8 o'clock at night, but you cancel whatever was on the schedule for tomorrow and you go out. In this case, it was a team of three dedicated anglers — Carmen, his wife **Angela Basciano** and **Jodi Zifferer**, a frequent

co-conspirator, who were on deck. They set out early and pushed south, and it was a good day right from the start. By 9 a.m., they had released 8 sails, and it continued like that all day. Working the greenish against the purple water, going down past Islamorada in seas of 2-3 feet, they handled double and triple hook ups. They fished until the last hour, going through all their equipment and bait. Down to chewed up leaders on kite rods, they came home in the dark, in shock at the final count. They even ran out of sailfish release flags. Carmen says it was his best ever day, in 8 years of fishing regularly: boated 21, out of 30 shots. At the end of the day, what was their celebration? A round of high fives, and then time to clean the boat...
