success of the last 30 years and to the bright future we have ahead."

The afternoon continued with acknowledgments by Ocean Reef Acquisition Committee members and **ORC** Founding Fathers Tom Davidson and Alan Goldstein - who in 1992, represented the Members in the purchase of Ocean Reef and were fundamental in raising the money to do so. To achieve their lofty mission, they created two categories of Membership - Charter and Patron - that ultimately made the purchase of Ocean Reef possible.

Through the conviction of those who took the leap of faith into Membership, and the determination and persuasiveness by Davidson and Goldstein, \$52 million was raised in less than six weeks - enough to insure the funds required for the 1993 purchase.

During the event, Davidson acknowledged the integral role those Patron Members played in the Buyout. "I want to share my gratitude with the Members in this room because without all of you, Ocean Reef Club would be a very different place. You all took a chance. It was a bold-faced gamble for your love of the Club. If not for you, we would have become a resort with a community attached instead of a private community with a hotel attached. There's a big difference in that."

Goldstein added, "It was never work to put this together. It was always fun and always a challenge. Thanks to the support of all of you, it worked and it worked well. We are blessed."

While the event in the Cultural Center was intended to recognize the Club's Members, the Members equally expressed their gratitude for the two Founders in attendance. The sentiment in the room was palpable with **Paul Bishop** standing and making a toast on behalf of his fellow Patron Members.

"Choosing to buy into Ocean Reef Club was a big decision for all of us," he said. "Why'd we do it? Because of the faith and belief we had in these two gentlemen." Gesturing towards Davidson and Goldstein, he said, "For that, let's salute to these two leaders who, with the help of some others, made this all happen."

With that, the group stood for a standing ovation, raised their glasses, and next made their way into the Cultural Center Theater to watch the screening of the Birth of Our Club presentation.

Rules Reminder: On-Time Payment

All food, beverage, merchandise and services of the Club charged to the member's account shall be billed monthly and each member's account shall be due and payable upon receipt of the monthly statement.

A member shall have up to 60 days from the date of the related statement to notify the Club in writing of any charge that is being contested. Thereafter, the member shall be deemed to have approved all charges set forth on the statement and shall be precluded from contesting any of such charges unless, due to extenuating circumstances, the Chairman or the President shall permit any charge to be contested.

If a member has not paid all charges within 60 days from the end of the month in which the charges were incurred, the account shall be deemed delinquent and charge privileges will be suspended.

If a member has not paid all charges within 90 days from the end of the month in which the charges were incurred, then the Board of Directors may determine at any time that the Club shall avail itself of any of the remedies permitted by the By-laws of the Club, as amended.

Note: A membership card may not be used by any person other than the person to whom it is issued. This rule, along with a request to present your membership card at the point of sale was designed to protect members from improper charges.


the White House. The pace is breathtaking. The series rocketed to the top of Netflix's ratings. They have already renewed it for a second season.



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Looking Back

Our home in the mountains of Idaho was a fifteen-minute drive from one of our favorite local trailheads. The Johnstone Creek hike wandered through a grassy mountain meadow. Then, as the valley narrowed, it followed a small brushy stream that you could easily jump across. After a short steep climb through a grove of majestic pines, the trail wound along the ridge line leading to a rocky outcropping. We loved spending time in that spot. From there, you could look back and appreciate the vista, the beauty of where the trail had taken you.

Just over one year ago, we were at a different trailhead. We were anticipating celebrating the first worship service in the new Ocean Reef Chapel & Fellowship Center. It had taken far more than fifteen minutes to get to that point. It was a journey of more than three years. It had been led by an extraordinary team of devoted leaders who managed a complex, demanding process that brought us to that moment. The support and generosity of so many from the Ocean Reef Community made it all possible.

So now is an opportune time to look back across the past year to consider how this space has served the four congregations who are the one community of the chapel, and the Ocean Reef Community.

It all started on the Sunday of Memorial Day in 2022. It was the very first service of worship. Everyone was deeply moved by the beauty of the worship space, and impressed by the many additional spaces that support the mission of the congregations, and the community.

Following the service, a reception was held in the **John** and **Marlene Boll** Garden. John served as the Honorary Chair of the New Chapel Committee. He could regularly be seen in his golf cart, watching the progress of construction, and inquiring about the details of the building with keen interest. We were grateful that he was able to attend that first service with Marlene and members of their family before his passing later in the summer.

The Farmer Family Memorial Garden has become a place for quiet reflection and warm appreciation for the memory of the lives of those loved ones and friends whose names are engraved on the walls. More than sixty people have selected their Memorial Wall plaques to date.

But the question is, "What's taken place in the Ocean Reef Chapel & Fellowship Center since the season began last fall?" The answer is, "A lot!"

Between September of 2022, and the first two weeks of April 2023, the Chapel and Fellowship Center has welcomed more than fifteen thousand people through its doors! Let me first break it down by the congregations.

There have been weddings, memorial services, baptisms, and special events. The Roman Catholic Congregation has exceeded 3.080 people who participated in the weekly Mass. The Episcopal Congregation has served more than 200 people at its weekly Eucharist service on Wednesday mornings. Congregation Ocean Reef has had more than 1,500 people attend Shabbat and High Holy Day services. More than 6,500 people have participated in the life of the Protestant

Congregation during this time. However, the purpose of the Chapel and Fellowship Center is not only to provide for the mission of the four congregations, but also to enrich the life of the Ocean Reef Community by providing space for gatherings to take place.

Participation in noncongregation meetings from the Ocean Reef Community totaled more than 700 people. And more than 1,300 people have come through the doors as visitors, either in tours, or at the open house gatherings held.

What matters most is what those above numbers represent. Each number represents an individual, a couple, a family, or an organization. People from the congregations bring a desire to express their faith, to grow in their faith, or seek the meaning, purpose, and hope that God longs for each of us to discover from a life of faith. People who gather here from the community do so to contribute to the flourishing of life in Ocean Reef Club.

Wrapping this up, my view at this moment is not from a rocky outcropping, but from the comfort of my chair in the condo.

But my vista is inspiring as I look back across this first year. It fills me with gratitude for the extraordinary leadership team, for your generosity that has made this possible, and most of all, for God's faithfulness in what is taking place in our lives together.



We Mourn the Loss George Kamman Gosko

George Kamman Gosko age 98 died of natural causes on October 8, 2022 at Shell Point, Ft. Meyers, FL. He was born on October 17, 1923 in Selkirk, Manitoba, Canada to Jeannette Kamman Gosko and Daniel Jerry Gosko. Preceding him in death, his wife Cissy Forcey Gosko, his son Judd Gosko, brother Albert and sister Edith Bauman (Carol). Surviving him are his daughter Midge Googooian, his son George Gosko Jr. and wife Susie, five grandchildren, Corrie Lamb (Dallas), Elliot, Dana Morris (David), Jennifer Gosko, Russell Gosko and four great-grandchildren, Sybil Newman, Saoirse Lamb, Dylan Morris and Dakota Morris.

He attended Wayzata Consolidated Public School in Minnesota starting in 1st grade. He was moved to Hopkins High School for his last 2 years of high school and graduated in June 1942.

His first job after high school was a groomer, cleaning engines, wheel wells, chemical toilets, etc. of DC-3 passenger aircraft for Northwest Airlines. He gave up this fine position after five months because the war was on and he had been accepted into the United States Army Air Corps Cadet Program. He completed pilot training, got his wings and was commissioned a 2nd Lt. in June 1944, after which he was based in England with the 8th Airforce and flew 35 bombing missions in B-17s against strategic targets in Germany and was awarded the usual medals.

After the war, he enrolled in business school at the University of Minnesota, joined Phi Kappa Psi, and lived in the fraternity house on campus. The very best thing

Two years later, they were married despite family objections. They left the university without graduating and set out to face the world together.

George went to work for Peavey Company, a privatelyheld family company (not his family), engaged in the grain and flour milling business. George, Cissy and their three children moved many times in his progression within the company. They moved from Minneapolis to St. Peter, MN, to Redwood Falls, MN, to Atwater, MN, to Bismarck, ND, to Minneapolis, to Winnipeg, Manitoba, back to Minneapolis, back again to Winnipeg and then back to Minneapolis when he became President of Peavey Company, which had by then become a larger and more diversified Fortune 200 company listed on the New York Stock Exchange.

When George was 50, he and Cissy built their dream home in Snowmass Village, CO. A place they truly enjoyed alone and with family and friends.

George had an active life. Played a lot of tennis, golf and squash. He enjoyed hunting ducks and upland game birds. Loved being in the mountains skiing, hiking and relaxing. He skied actively until his 82nd year. To celebrate his 62nd birthday he climbed "Capital Peak" without ropes. Another highlight: He shot his age at Card Sound Golf Club when he was 73.

George retired at age 62 and he and Cissy took on a third residence within Ocean Reef Club.

In addition to corporate boards, he served on the following arts boards: The Royal Winnipeg Ballet, the Minneapolis Institute of Art, the Minnesota Orchestra and the Guthrie Theatre.

During his lifetime, he was affiliated with the following private clubs: Winnipeg Lawn and Tennis Club (Pres.), Saint Charles Golf Club (Pres.), Lafayette Club, the Minneapolis Club, the Minikahda Club, the Ocean Reef Club and the Card Sound Golf Club.

His self-assessment was that "he was a very ordinary man that had a magical life."

His body has been willed to the University of Miami, Miller School of Medicine. Funeral services will be private.




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Is the Myth About Recycling True?

There has been a myth circulating at our school that recycling goes to the same place as the trash (the landfill). For years, some people have been wondering about this, so we decided to find out the truth.

On March 15, we had two representatives from Monroe County Waste Management come and talk to us about solid waste, where it goes, and how it gets processed. Israel Salgado, Director of Solid Waste at Ocean Reef Club, talked to our 6th grade Library class. He was accompanied by Melody Tusher from Monroe County Waste Management. We learned that recycling is collected once a week

and trash three times a week, on different days. We thought this was a very fair schedule. That means that the trash and recycling are collected separately.

We also learned that the recycling goes to a transfer station on CR 905. Next, the recycling gets sorted by machine and then by hand. All of the different materials are separated. After the sorting process, the recycling goes to the processing center in Pembroke Pines, Florida. There, the recycling is compacted into bales, which are then reused to make shoes, tires, toys, etc.

However, if one piece of trash stays in with the recycling when it gets to the processing center, the recycling batch is contaminated. Then they must throw away all of that batch and the recyclable materials go with the trash into large landfills, sitting there to decay. This also happens when the recycling has food or leftover liquid inside. If you have finished drinking a drink and go to recycle the bottle, make sure you wash out everything inside before you recycle it.

Another thing we learned is to try not to make so much waste. Ms. Tusher said that only 20% of plastic bottles are recycled each year. Try to reuse your waste for other things, such as art projects or crafts.

To wrap things up, Ocean Reef Club has a great recycling program, and the recycling goes to a separate place from the garbage. Keep in mind that people hand-sort the recycling, cleaning up after others that don't clean up after themselves. Please make sure to clean up after yourself and keep our earth clean!

Then in 1993, cyber-geeks started to refer to unwanted emails and chat messages as spam. The word was popularized twenty years earlier in a Monty Python Flying Circus TV skit (cult classic!). In the sketch, the actors chant the word SPAM repeatedly, interrupting and overwhelming the lines of the other cast members.

From its early beginnings, spam, telemarketing, and robocalls have been a major threat for anyone with a phone. In January 2023, Americans received 5.51

billion robocalls -- nearly 20 spam calls for every person in the US.**

The FTC's (Federal Trade Commission's) **National Do Not Call Registry** website <u>https://www.donotcall.gov</u> is a good line of defense; list your phone number on a registry that blocks telemarketers from "robocalling" you (but unfortunately does not stop

scammers).

Since 2019, the FCC (Federal Communications Commission) requires all phone carriers to use a STIR/ SHAKEN protocol, which stands for Secure Telephone Identity Revisited (STIR) and Signature-based Handling of Asserted Information Using toKENs (SHAKEN); it is designed to require phone providers to verify where calls are coming from with Caller ID and Block This Caller options (both offered by Android and iPhones).

For an extra level of security, download free spam-blocking apps for your phone service: AT&T's ActiveArmor https://www.att. com/security, Verizon's Call Filter https://www.verizon. com/solutions-and-services/ call-filter, T-Mobile's Scam Shield https://www.t-mobile. com/customers/scam-shield or pay services like RoboKiller https://app.robokiller.com, TrueCaller <u>https://www.</u> truecaller.com, or YouMail https://www.youmail.com. Not only do these services block unwanted calls but they also send you a notification when your number is being hacked or appears on the "dark web."

Not Kermit the Frog Here

Another wildlife update, not to scare---but, to be aware of a "threat to your pet". Most of us in South Florida are familiar with the "bufo toad" (cane or marine toad) that is usually seen in the rainy season from about May through October, which is also their mating season. So as a reminder, please review the following data about this poisonous toad for the safety of your lovable pet.

Where did they come from? The bufo toad is native to Central and South America, but it can be found across Florida and the Keys. These toads were apparently brought to Florida in the 1930s to help with pest control in the sugar cane fields.

What do they look like?

It is a large brown and gray

toad with a creamy yellow belly. It has large glands on its back. The adult toads are six to nine inches or even can reach 10 inches. It sits in an upright position even when it is moving and it hops fast.

Where do they live?

The bufo toad lives in developed areas and the wild. They hide under foliage and are attracted to bugs.

How can they harm my pet?

The bufo toad is more often



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harmful to dogs, but they can poison a cat, too.

When the bufo toad is confronted, it secretes a venom that is toxic to animals and can also cause skin irritation for owners. If an animal licks or touches the toad, the adverse reactions are fairly quick and include difficulty breathing, convulsions, vomiting, and more. The toad does not attack, but when startled will secrete these toxins that can kill. The only thing a pet owner can then do is rinse out the pet's mouth with a very wet washcloth to try and remove the poison. Some pet owners have used a garden hose to rinse out the animal's mouth, but that can easily push the toxin into the lungs and could cause more harm. Of course, the pet should be taken to a veterinary clinic immediately for treatment.

What can I do to avoid this nasty

Properly Dispose of Medications with Public Safety

Last week, the Medical Center detailed safe medication disposal methods and the importance it provides for the environment. Here is a follow up from ORCA Public Safety on another easy way to dispose of your medications safely at Ocean Reef.

Thanks to a strong collaboration between ORCA Public Safety, the Medical Center, and Sheriff's Office, members and employees have a free, no-questions-asked way to dispose of prescription drugs and over-the-counter medications. Using the drug box in the lobby of the Public Safety building is the best way to safely

Do not leave food or even water outside. Bufos love to sit in water dishes and could leave toxins in the dish. When we lived in Miami, we sometimes would leave a water bowl out by the screened-in pool for our dog. That ended quickly after we saw this enormous toad sitting in the dish. Keep your dog on a leash and always carry a flashlight at night so you can see where and what your dog is sniffing. Check out your yard or walking path; being curious about your surroundings is always recommended. You are allowed to remove this toad (carefully) if you see one or call a professional in for help.

This is the season for these toads and there have been some sightings at The Reef. It is important to know that this toad is a potential hazard for all of our beloved pets.

dispose of unused or expired medicines. You don't even have to remove the labels, as the box is locked until the Monroe County Sheriff's Office collects it.

Properly dispose of prescriptions to:

- Reduce cases of addiction.
- Prevent accidental intake by children.

• Eliminate introducing environmentally damaging substances into the water system. Please do not flush medications down toilets and sinks. A recent threeyear study by FIU and the Bonefish & Tarpon Trust found pharmaceutical contaminants in the blood and tissues of bonefish and their prey (crabs, shrimp, and fish) living in Biscayne Bay and the Florida Keys.

Summer Orchids

Whether you leave The Reef in the summer or stay to enjoy those tropical breezes in the warmer months, your orchids that have given you so much joy during the Season need a welldeserved break.

Michael Coronado, Vice President of R. F. Orchids, shared some tips on keeping orchids healthy and ready to bloom later in the year so you can marvel at their beauty once again. They just need your TLC.

Humidity & the Rains

As you know, the rainy months are approaching and so is higher



humidity. Although orchids love humidity, the summer rains can be too much of a good thing. Michael recommends that orchids tied on trees should have their misters turned off as the regular rains should be enough to keep the orchids irrigated. Orchids under cover or on porches should continue to be watered once or twice a week. Also, watering should be done (when possible) earlier in the morning. It is important to check your orchid plants for appropriate moisture and then

stay on a watering schedule.

Fresh Air

Orchids need a bit of a breeze--so spending some time to check out the placement of your plants with the prevailing winds is worthwhile. Michael remarked that we are lucky to be so close to the ocean breezes.

Sunburn Protection

Orchids get sunburned, too. It is time to layer on more Spanish Moss all over the orchid leaves to protect them and actually serve as their special sunblock, per Michael.

Chemical Solutions

Fungicide, insect and mite control, and 20-20-20 allpurpose plant food can save your plants from fungus, snails that make your leaves look like "swiss cheese", and root rot. Michael recommends that all of these treatments should be chosen carefully and applied with care sparingly.

Energy Saved

As your plants have their last blooms, cut the blooms off to give your orchids a rest. All energy will then transfer to the plant and give you stronger plants with gorgeous blooms in the future.

As Michael Coronado shared, the orchids we all enjoy in our pots, on our trees, or on our dining room table put us in our "happy place". We only need to give them a bit of extra care over the summer for them to return to their glory next Season.

On February 15, my oldest son and I journeyed to Argentina in search of the fabled Sea-run Brown Trout. After an overnight in Buenos Aires (8 1/2 hr. flight) it was on to Ushuaia (another 3 1/2 hr. flight) to the very tip of Argentina called Tierra del Fuego, "The Land of Fire".

This area was named by Magellan, because when his group of ships sailed close to the coastline, the local Indians, some of which were cannibals, would light fires all along the coast. Some were for warmth in their huts, since most wore no clothing, but Magellan felt many were also signals of approaching danger.

Tierra del Fuego is part of an area of Argentina called Patagonia. This area was also named by Magellan for a group of local Indians they encountered. These were a giant tribe, known to be as tall as 10 feet. Magellan named them the Patagones, which translated to Big Feet, because some of these giants wore animal skins around their feet which made them look enormous. They eventually turned to the Spanish translation of Patagonia.

Magellan had a firsthand encounter with these people, as he captured two, and was taking them to the King of Spain when, unfortunately, they died. Some said because the captivity destroyed their spirit. Magellan himself was later killed in the Philippines by natives in a fight he should not have started.

Ushuaia is the port for the Exploration ships to Antarctica, but our journey took us north 80 miles through the mountains. At the town of Rio Grande, we turned west for our remaining

one-hour drive on dirt roads, to the Estancia del San Jose.

This is a 24,000-acre ranch owned by Ted Turner of Turner Broadcasting that a few lucky anglers are allowed to visit each year. The ranch is an actual working ranch with sheep and cattle and maintains a full-time staff. For the next 6 1/2 days we explored the ranch's 12 1/2 miles of private waters.

Although the water was still very low due to a drought in the area, we found many pools that held fish. The local brown trout that had not gone to sea yet were a beautiful orange-brown color with red, green, and black spots, and were in the 5-8 lb. range. The sea-run were much larger - my son caught a 16 1/2 lb. - and were bright silver with black spots. Obviously, a transition to help from the predators of the open ocean. It was great fun where flyfishing expertise was rewarded.

Of special note was the ever-

changing weather with mixtures of sun, rain and wind. One afternoon I had to quit fishing as the gusts reached 70 mph. I worried about getting blown over, even while I was waist-deep fishing a pool.

What a grand trip to "The Land of Fire" made very special by our hosts at Estancia del San Jose, and the bonus of being able to fish with my son.



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

Marine RADAR Safe Operation #17



The ubiquitous radar dome goes almost unnoticed in our local area. Almost every boat over 24 feet has one and most are rarely turned on. Generally, the visibility is good and fog is rare in our waters. Having said that, It is a good idea to practice with reading the display for when it's really needed. Todays marine radars place the image on top of the nautical chart making it considerably easier to interpret the image. I found it is very helpful seeing Daybeacons and shallow water marks. ORC Harbor entrance Image example:



The Beam rotates in azmuith about 50 times a minute inside the dome to produce the image of the area selected. This results in a Maximum range 40 nm with range discrimination of 16 m.



Here is the safety warning:



A typical power output 4000 Watts peak in a focused beam of 4 degrees wide by 13 degrees high. While the radar is operating, never allow someone to stand and reach to adjust an antenna, light or fishing gear at the same height of the radome. To avoid possible personal injury, do not look directly at the antenna at close range when the radar is transmitting. Eyes are the most sensitive part of the body to electromagnetic energy. The rotating bar antenna produces a tighter beam for higher resolution and includes the risk of

hitting something or fishing line entanglement. Turn the radar off is someone needs to access the area or if you really don't need it in close harbor areas.

How Much Turn Can You Create?

Having the ability to turn will depend on each individual, but there is always a way for us to increase the amount of rotation we can achieve! How we do this involves the ground and what happens under your feet.

Analyzing Baseball Pitchers

Why do baseball pitchers create a wind up before they pitch the ball? They are looking to create as much velocity as they possibly can when throwing off the mound.

The "rubber" part of the

mound, which they push off during the motion, helps them create leverage under the inside of their foot to allow more powerful throwing motions.

Relating Pitching to the Golf Swing

In the golf swing, we do not want our feet to be still or quiet. In order to create power and an athletic motion during these golf swings, we need our feet to create a similar type of leverage as a baseball pitcher.

Drills to Improve Rotation

1. Start with your feet together while holding the club out in front of you.

2. Take one step with your trail foot (right foot for right-handed players, left foot for left-handed players) feeling the pressure on the inside of that foot when you take that step.

3. Swing the club to the top of the back swing and hold that position for one or two seconds.



4. Swing the club through to your finish while pushing off your trail foot creating your baseball pitch feeling.


Practicing these drills is going to help you create a bigger and more efficient turn during the back swing by allowing a transfer of pressure to take place! We can then turn with our upper body getting behind the ball which creates space for the rest of our golf swing. No more over the top swings, no more keeping our feet still... create your leverage today at the Academy of Golf!

Serving Strategies for Singles



Tennis Tip" by Hannah Fleckenstein, Head Tennis Professional

No tennis match or practice is ever the same. As I have mentioned in previous tips, there are many variables when playing the sport. What surface are the courts? Is it hot or is cold out? Is there wind? What side does the sun shine in my eyes more? Is my opponent left-handed or right-handed? The list could go on and on.

Besides our attitude and

energy, we can control one thing: our strategy. Our strategy will change based on the variables I have mentioned (plus many I have not). But putting those variables aside, we should always have one concrete game plan that we can start with. Let's call this Plan A.

For me, Plan A involves controlling most points with my forehand, opening up the court with angles, coming to net once I get my opponent on the run and finishing with a volley. So, how can I make that happen? Well, it all starts with the first shots of the point: the serve and the return.

If I am serving, I often choose a serve that I know will set my opponent up to hit to my forehand. Since I am a righty, on the deuce side I will hit the serve out wide in hopes that the returner will choose the safest return location, cross court to my forehand. On the ad side I often serve up the "T" in hopes that the returner will again choose the safest location for their return, 'inside in' to my forehand.

Second to those locations I will serve down the middle of the service box, towards my opponent's body, in hopes of jamming them up and receiving a short return that I can put away (this is known as a body serve).

We always want to mix up our serve locations to keep our opponents guessing, but we also always have to be thinking about playing to our strengths.

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BRIDGE TIP

Opening **Preempts**



by Gregg Van Dyke, Director of Card & Games

Preempts are weak bids that are designed to a) interfere with the opponent's bidding and b) describes your hand to partner in one bid. Once a preempt bid is made; unless forced, only the partner may continue bidding for his side.

Requirements

1. 0 to 10 HCPs (If you have more than 10 HCPs, consider opening at the 1-level).

- 2. At least a 6-card or longer suit.
- 3. No 4-card outside major.

Now count your tricks:

Count the number of winners you should receive from the honors in your hand and the number of cards over 3 in any suit.

Examples:

1. ♠KQJ9754 ♥765 ♦4 ♣32 6 tricks	4. ♦ 987 ♥ ♦K74 ♣ KJ97653 5 tricks
 2. ▲8 ★AQ87642 ◆Q542 ◆2 7 tricks 	5. ▲ KQJ9762 ♥7654 ♦3 ♣3 Open 1 ▲
3. ♦ 9 ♥76 ♦QJ9876 ♦ J987 5 tricks	

Vulnerability ("Rule of 2, 3 and 4")

If your side is vulnerable and the opponents are not, then you can open the preempt missing 2 tricks.

Open at the 3-level if you have 7 tricks. Open at the 4-level if you have 8 tricks.

If both sides have equal vulnerability, then you can open the preempt missing 3 tricks.

Open at the 3-level if you have 6 tricks. Open at the 4-level if you have 7 tricks.

If your side is not vulnerable and the opponents are, then you can open the preempt missing 4 tricks.

Open at the 3-level if you have 5 tricks. Open at the 4-level if you have 6 tricks.

Responses

Since the preempt bid shows a weak hand, the responder will usually pass. But if the responder has a better than an opening hand and a strong 5-card suit, he can bid at the 3-level. This bid is forcing! The opener will either raise the partner's suit if he has support or repeat the preempt.

Clearly East wants to be in a major, instead of diamonds. He bids 3♠ then will bid 4♥ to give his partner a choice.

But be careful! Always check the vulnerability. If partner opened on favorable vulnerability, then he will probably opened light. Have more than an opener if you decide to respond.





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
