Marina Seawall & Dolphin Course Enter Final Stages

The Marina seawall project and Dolphin Course re-grass are in their final stages, with both slated for completion prior to the start of season. As demonstrated by this series of photographs taken over the course of the summer, the transformation of these areas has come a long way in a matter of months. Thanks in large part to the dedication of a number of partner contractors under Mic O'Keeffe's (VP of Sports & Amenities) oversight, as well as Director of Agronomy Eric Bennett and the Golf Course Maintenance Team.

With the heavy lifting complete for both projects and only finishing touches left to go, here's what you can expect to be done in the coming weeks.

Marina:

- Seawall work scheduled for completion in mid-October (Fuel, D, E and F Docks are already fully operational with H Dock slated to reopen in the weeks ahead).
- Restoration work on the golf cart parking lot adjacent to D and E Docks.
- Reinstatement of the asphalt parking lot and driveway entries.
- Landscaping and site restoration work.

Dolphin Course:

- Removal of rocks, weeds and all other contaminants from waste areas, which have acted as makeshift staging areas throughout the project.
- Light dressing of bunker sand to give them a bright white look of contrast.
- Bed edging, pine straw installation, and course opening preparation.
- Dolphin Course opening celebration – Tuesday, October



Carysfort Reef: An Unwavering Commitment **Amidst** Challenging Times

This summer has been a particularly challenging one for our coral reefs. An El Niño event exacerbated by the warming effect of our ongoing carbon emissions, resulted in unprecedented heatwaves that hit the headlines around the world. The impacts were felt underwater as well, with Florida's coral reefs sounding the alarm on what will likely become a global coral bleaching event.

What is coral bleaching?

Coral bleaching amplified by climate change is the biggest threat to coral reefs around

the world. A stress response to conditions including elevated sea temperatures, bleaching is the process where corals lose the symbiotic algae- called zooxanthellae- that live in their tissues, provide them with most of their food, and give them their color. Bleached corals are white because the flesh of the coral animal is transparent and without its algae the coral skeleton becomes visible. While bleaching makes corals more vulnerable to disease and

other threats, it is important to understand that bleached corals are not yet dead. They can recover if the stressor subsides, and the zooxanthellae returns. However, if the stressor lasts for too long or is too extreme, bleached corals will eventually starve to death.

Early in 2023, in anticipation of a difficult summer, Coral Restoration FoundationTM (CRF) had been working with partners coordinated by NOAA on a plan to safeguard as much genetic diversity as possible before the onset of this year's predicted bleaching, which was expected to hit in late August. But by mid-July, CRF teams visiting reefs in the Lower Keys began to witness some dramatic impacts of elevated water temperatures and it was necessary to put this plan into action sooner than anticipated. CRF and partners activated a well-organized, strategic rescue effort, applying more than a decade of expertise to mobilize teams, leverage relationships, and deploy infrastructure to move as much genetic material and coral stock as possible into land-based systems for safekeeping.

Carysfort Reef

While the initial impacts were observed on reefs in the Lower Keys, as the summer progressed, reefs in the Upper Keys also began to display signs of stress with corals paling, bleaching, and succumbing to disease. While different reefs experienced various levels of bleaching and mortality, no reef in the Florida Keys was unaffected. Carysfort Reef was one of the last sites to begin bleaching, but a rapid assessment this September shows that few corals on the reef were spared, with most displaying varying degrees of paling, bleaching, and mortality. The CRF Carysfort Coral TreeTM Nursery did, however, fare better than other in-situ nurseries in the Keys, with around 60-percent of its corals still holding strong.

Amidst these challenges, Carysfort is still a testament to the potential for resilience of our coral ecosystems. The corals on this site were some of the last to begin showing signs of thermal stress. And, as water temperatures begin to stabilize below the 86-Fahrenheit bleaching threshold, pale and bleached corals have a chance of bouncing back. Research suggests that the corals that do recover are likely to be thermally hardened and potentially more capable of withstanding future warming events.

Bleaching Impacts

Over the coming months, Coral Restoration FoundationTM will continue deploying teams to monitor restoration sites - Carysfort included - capturing accurate, qualitative assessments of surviving corals. With this, we will not only have a comprehensive understanding of the impact of this bleaching event, but data that will inform and strengthen restoration efforts moving forward.

The dedication of Coral Restoration Foundation, backed by the generous support from communities like Ocean Reef Club, will undoubtedly play a pivotal role in steering Carysfort Reef, and others like it, towards a brighter, more resilient future, despite the challenges currently facing our planet's life support systems.

ORCA NEWS

Navigating Drone Regulations in Ocean Reef

Offering a wide range of applications from aerial photography to surveying and monitoring, drone use continues to grow in popularity. Our stunning views and surrounding waters make drone photography especially desirable. However, drone use is strictly governed by specific rules and regulations.

Recreational Use Prohibited

To protect your security and privacy, recreational flying of drones is prohibited in Ocean Reef. The restriction also prevents dangerous interference with the Ocean Reef Airport.



Approved Drone Uses

With proper approval, the Ocean Reef Club (ORC), Ocean Reef Community Association (ORCA). Club members, and businesses may use drones for non-recreational use. If you are looking to operate a drone for a specific purpose, you must obtain advance, written approval from both ORCA and ORC. Requests by Club members or any entities must be submitted to the Club's Communications Department at least 48 hours before a planned flight time at communications@oceanreef.

com. This approval process involves coordination between the ORC Communications Department, Airport, and ORCA Public Safety.

Safety in the Skies

Even approved use of drones in Ocean Reef is restricted to maintain safety within the community's airspace. The Ocean Reef Airport is located in Intermittent Class E controlled airspace. There are designated no-fly zones surrounding the Airport and flight paths. It's mandatory for drone operators to acquaint themselves with these designated zones and communicate with the Airport accordingly. Some requests may be denied should they encroach on airspace.

Respecting Privacy

Ocean Reef is committed to protecting its Members' and their

guests' privacy and tranquility. Thus, specific rules govern the use of drones to capture images or videos of private properties, boats, airplanes, or Club members. Unless written permission is obtained from the relevant parties, drones may not photograph these subjects. Drone flights must not disrupt the peace or disturb any Members.



Searching For a Home

For the first time in five decades, Jane and I find ourselves searching for a home. By home, I mean a home in faith — a church home.

This summer, we finally moved into our new home further north on the east coast of Florida. It is in a beautiful, gated golf community. But instead of the Atlantic Ocean or Card Sound, our back porch overlooks a small pond, one of many on the property. Unlike Ocean Reef, there is no private airport. And the only boat I've seen belongs to a professional bass tournament fisherman.

On Sunday mornings, it's not hop in our golf cart and drive to the chapel. We live halfway between two thriving smaller communities. So that means a 15- to 20-minute drive in the car, either north or south.

In our search, we find ourselves like most – not making 'brand loyalty' our top priority. The time with you in the chapel community over the past decade has profoundly shaped our

priorities. There is no shortage of places to choose between. So, what are we looking for?

Finding Our People

When we built the new chapel, my encouragement to the building committee was that they provide lots of what is known as 'public space.' That's the gathering space outside and around the worship space. It's the place where newcomers, like ourselves, ask themselves, "Are these my people?" The committee did so, wonderfully.

One of the benefits of a place like Ocean Reef is that it makes it less of a challenge to find your people. While certainly not without some diversity, there are certain common factors you share with those who qualify as Equity or Legacy Members.

But up here, we are on the hunt to find our people.

Vibrant Worship

Last week, we visited a new church for the first time. The reason is because of the lovely lady who delivers our mail. As I helped her with a package one day, she confessed to looking at our mail. I can see you are people of faith, she said, and I'd like to invite you to our church! Way to go postal lady! So, we went.

As we found our seat, we were greeted by our mail lady, her husband, and several others. We even met two couples from our club. The congregation gave off the right vibes.

But then came the worship service. Let's just say I'm glad I wasn't sitting on the platform. It gave me a serious case of the 'nods.'

We are equally at home with either 'contemporary' worship or 'traditional' worship – so long as it is done well. But if the elements of worship and the singing are desultory or half-hearted, which it was, so likely is the faith. And the preaching that morning...if it was a road map, there was no obvious destination!

Grounded Faith

Maybe you're surprised that wasn't first on our list. But it is at the heart of any final decision to lock into a faith community.

Many describe our nation as a divided nation – and we are politically. However, from a cultural and church standpoint, we are more like a broken dish with pieces scattered everywhere.

A grounded faith is not where everyone marches in lockstep, expecting rote, simplistic answers to tough questions. But it is one professing confidence in God's story in the Scripture. It must honor the roots of our faith in the life of, and in God's continuing love for, the Jewish

people. And it must express our faith and embody our hope grounded in the Gospel of Christ's resurrection and His living, risen presence.

Opportunity to Serve

At this point in my life, when my successor is chosen at the chapel, I won't be looking for another lead pastor position with a congregation. However, Jane and I both want to be in a place where we can continue to serve and support the congregation, using our gifts and resources. And I want to cheer on and support the man or woman who is the pastor!

Coming Together

We're ramping up for another new season of life together in the chapel. Maybe you're looking for the same things Jane and I are – a faith home. If so, let me encourage you to visit one of our four congregations when you're back. You're bound to find your people in one of them, with vibrant worship and grounded faith. And oh yes, there are plenty of opportunities to serve.

We hope to see you there, and trust you'll find your home in faith. In the meantime, up here, we're still looking!

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

NEWS FROM THE MEDICAL CENTER

Autumn 2023 Vaccine Information

The 2023-2024 influenza season is fast approaching and this year there are three vaccines to consider, the customary Flu vaccine, Respiratory Syncytial Virus vaccine (RSV) and, soon to be released, the updated COVID-19 booster that addresses the latest XBB variant of Omicron. Your healthcare provider can assist you in making the appropriate vaccine decisions.

Seasonal Flu Vaccine

The yearly flu vaccine is a straightforward recommendation. People who are ages 65 and older should receive the high-dose influenza vaccine. New this year - individuals with egg allergies can receive any influenza vaccine that is egg or non-egg-based



that is otherwise appropriate for their age. Typically, the seasonal influenza peaks in December-January. Getting vaccinated in September or October will still provide protection even if the flu season arrives in February or March.

Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV) Vaccines

Adults 60 years of age and older may receive a single dose of Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV) vaccine, using shared clinical decision-making. This means the decision to proceed

with a RSV vaccine should be made after discussing your health conditions with your physician and weighing the possibility of acquiring severe RSV, potential benefit, risk and limitations of the vaccine. RSV is not subject to seasonality, like the influenza vaccine and can be administered anytime. Those who might benefit the most from an RSV vaccine are patients with chronic diseases and who are moderately to severely immunosuppressed.

COVID-19 Vaccines

On September 12, 2023, the Advisory Committee of Immunizations Practices (ACIP) approved the following COVID-19 recommendations by majority vote, which have been adopted by the CDC Director and are now official.

The following are the CDC recommendations for the use of the 2023-2024 formulations of Moderna COVID-19 and Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 vaccine:

- Everyone ages 5 years and older is recommended to receive 1 dose of the updated (2023-2024 formula) mRNA COVID-19 vaccine.
- Bivalent mRNA COVID-19 vaccines are no longer recommended in the United States

Individuals who have had a recent COVID-19 infection or have received a dose of the current bivalent vaccine should wait at least 3 months before receiving the updated booster.

This year's updated flu vaccine, RSV vaccine and the approved

Pfizer COVID-19 booster (COMIRNATY) are available now at the Medical Center. Your healthcare provider can discuss vaccine options with you, as well as the timing. Currently, there are no set guidelines for the timing on how multiple vaccines are administered, however, many experts recommend a two-week interval between RSV and COVID-19 vaccines.

Should I Still be Testing for COVID-19?

The answer is yes. Many people who are infected with COVID-19 have been reporting milder symptoms such as cough, congestion and headache. These symptoms can often seem like a cold or the flu. If you have any of these symptoms, it is important to test for COVID-19 to discern appropriate treatment and prevent exposure to others. Do check the expiration dates of at-home COVID-19 test kits. Some of the expiration dates have been extended and this information is available on the FDA website www.fda.gov. Type into the search box "expiration dates on COVID test kits" to populate the manufacturer's name and extended expiration dates.

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Playing the Long Game

What do eating walnuts, lifting weights barefoot, volunteering, and playing tennis have in common? They can all boost your odds of living longer.

Nutrition-packed walnuts are considered the healthiest nut. Shoe-less training helps increase balance and coordination. Volunteering promotes physical activity and a sense of purpose. The short and steady bursts of high intensity experienced by playing tennis may add up to 9.7 years to your life, according to a well-publicized 25-year-long study in Denmark on the link between sports and longevity.

New findings on ways to add on more years are reported in documentaries, articles, books, and podcasts practically daily, offering a lot of great tips:

Live to 100: Secrets of the Blue Zones Netflix docuseries, 4 episodes

Transcontinental cyclist turned best-selling anti-aging author, Dan Buettner, 63, has spent the last 20 years writing about the commonalities of people living in the world's "blue zones." These are communities whose populations have a higher-than-average life expectancy. His research has led him to produce a captivating documentary exploring places with the largest concentrations of centenarians. Interestingly, in these regions you don't see many or any wheelchairs, nursing homes, and health clubs.

Buettner takes you on a ride around the globe where he interviews people in Okinawa, Japan; Ikaria, Greece; Sardinia, Italy; Nicoya, Costa Rica; and Loma Linda, California, to discover what is special about the daily habits of its people. Each episode ends with an easy-to-

follow chart summarizing the population's common traits and behaviors.

The idea of the program is not to encourage people to move to these places, but to learn how to incorporate some of its secrets to achieve a long and purposeful life.

Outlive: The Science & Art Of Longevity;

Living well and long has also made Stanford University-educated physician Peter Attia, M.D., one of the nation's most sought-after speakers on longevity.

His podcast, *The Drive*, boasts millions of downloaded episodes covering a litany of bio-hacking related topics. The dangers of poor sleep, the importance of strength training and exercise, nutrition, brain health, and cancer and Alzheimer's prevention are some of the many areas explored.

Attia, 50, has recently published a nearly 500-page book, Outlive: The Science & Art Of Longevity that's been getting a lot of buzz. Companion Outlive recipe and workbooks are also available.

His not one-size-fits-all concept with regard to the right foods and workouts make this a fascinating read.

The Golden Bachelor: Reality TV, 8 episodes, 8 p.m. Thursdays on ABC. Stream on Hulu.



"Out Damned Spot".... Too bad Lady Macbeth didn't have Ocean Reef's **Member Dry** Cleaners service available to her. But happily, I did.... Last spring when I spilled a strawberry daiquiri on my white wool jacket, I was able to jump into my golf cart and immediately drop off my badly stained jacket at our cleaner. Three days later, when I picked it up, it was pristine, ready to wear for dinner that night at CH Prime... Access to a dry cleaner is one of the essential services at Ocean Reef that we sometimes take for granted. Think about it – without Member Dry Cleaners, just around the corner from Wynn's, I might have been required to drive to Homestead or Key Largo to resurrect my jacket.... I asked Evadney, the manager of the OR service, how it works. She told me that when you bring a garment in for cleaning, the first step is to number it and examine it for spots. Then it is put on a truck and delivered to a large dry-cleaning facility in Miami. Here your garment is put into a washing machine (way bigger than anything you have in your home) and gently agitated with a special solvent (not water). Then it is finished in a spinning cycle in a slow, temperature-controlled dryer. After a little ironing or steam pressing and an inspection for spots that may have been missed, your garment will be loaded onto the truck and delivered to Ocean Reef.... Dry cleaning is not the



only "aid to wardrobe" available at this Member Dry Cleaners facility. Suppose you are in need of an alteration. Don't despair. Last summer our Ocean Reef Dry Cleaner was enlarged and improved to accommodate a new tailoring service, that is operated by the very experienced and competent Lydia Dopico (pictured). For many years Lydia owned a similar l'Atelier in Miami, which was used by OR members (e.g. Joyce Farmer, Adelaide Skoglund), who persuaded her to come to the Reef. The addition of this professional tailoring service has proved to be much used and appreciated by grateful OR members.... LAST WORD: I believe that Lydia Dopico, who is dedicated to "a good fit", has certainly found one for her new l'Atelier, now encompassed in the Member Dry Cleaning at Ocean Reef.





The first question I would ask is: How often do you hit your approach shot within 15 feet? The majority of the world would say "very rarely". With this truth in mind, what we practice while we are putting is very important. I would follow up with a second question of: Which is more important when hitting a putt, speed, or direction?

When a player is of any significant distance from the hole

and on the green, having the correct speed gives the player the best chance to get the ball in the hole with two strokes.

Making the 10-foot putt is important, of course you should continue to practice that. We need to increase the amount of time we spend on our lag putting. Set golf balls up beginning at 15 feet all the way to 60 feet. The key while performing this is gaining a feel for how much "swing" we need to put into this motion in order to get the ball to the hole. Hitting the ball at certain distances is controlled by length or stroke and the speed of the putter at impact. It is vital for players to practice putting with speed control in mind, not just making the putt.

What should our target be? Make sure you can visualize a 3-foot circle around the hole while your goal is to roll your ball into that 3-foot circle. Practicing your lag putting will help decrease the amount of 3 putts we have on the golf course and help lower your scores.

Conquering the Leadville Trail 100 MTB

2023 Leadville Trail 100 MTB, starting at an elevation of 10,200 ft., going to almost 13,000 ft., 105.25 grueling miles, 11,568 vertical feet of climbing, three timed cutoffs in the book, belt buckle earned.

I did not do this in the time I wanted, trained for, or expected. The Wednesday prior to the race, I had learned I had critically low iron (this explained all the cramping throughout my body leading up to the race); I woke up on Saturday morning, August 12, 2023, and got myself to the start line.

Between miles 20 and 30, I realized it would be a long day; cramping had begun. I kept pushing. I came into Twin Lakes; my face already said it all, and the pain was written all over it. Generally, I smiled, talked,

but this time was different; we all knew it. I continued up Columbine. I knew the top of the Columbine climb had changed, but that was a challenging hike on a bike. Even when I would get on my bike and pedal, other riders were clogging up the trail, not having the understanding of moving off to the right when walking. So I had to go with the flow until a clearing. I got to the top of Columbine at 12,600 ft. and headed down; I love the downhill. I got back to Twin Lakes, picked up more nutrition, and was on my way to Powerline. My husband told everybody no matter how bad it got, I couldn't and wouldn't quit.

I fully expected not to go past Powerline. By this time, I was not in the greatest shape. However, the smiling faces of my totally awesome support crew were there. I could not let them down, so I went up Powerline. With Austin and Heather walking with me to the first summit (there were a total of 5), the encouragement they gave and the jokes they made had me smiling and wanting to finish. Up, up, up, and up I went, to the top of Powerline, then came a really sweet downhill to Hagerman. By the time I was on Hagerman, I was in tears. However, I was so close to finishing and there was no amount of pain at this point that would make me stop. The thought of quitting was with me all day, but the will to keep going won out. No matter how rough of shape I was in, I couldn't stop, I wouldn't quit, and the finish line was within reach.

I reached the top of Carter Summit, and my crew was there again, cheering me on and telling me to go. Austin gave me a push and away I went. I had more to climb until I reached the top and enjoyed another juicy downhill. I then got to the bottom of Kevin and realized I had to crank it, time was running out for me to make it to the finish.

As I got to the top of the Boulevard, I knew the finish line was just a few miles and pedal strokes away. I gave what I had left in the tank to get there in time. I MADE IT, I got my belt buckle. My friend Sammy was the first to greet me. He said, "You did it, way to go." I literally sat there, did not say much, and could not move. A few minutes later, Austin and Heather were there to help me. Austin had to lean my bike over so I could dismount and the day was done. My husband John met me, and with tears flowing down his cheeks, he hugged me. Had it not been for my fantastic support crew, I would not have made it to the finish line. Their support, encouragement, love, jokes, and cheering me on meant everything to me; I did not want to disappoint them or myself. They made the day so incredibly special. I am forever grateful and thankful for them.

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Opening Preempts



"Bridge Tip" by Gregg Van Dyke, Director of Card & Games

Preempts are weak bids that are designed to a) interfere with the opponent's bidding and b) describes your hand to partner in one bid. Once a preempt bid is made; unless forced, only the partner may continue bidding for his side.

Requirements

- 1. 0 to 10 HCPs (If you have more than 10 HCPs, consider opening at the 1-level).
- 2. At least a 6-card or longer suit.
- 3. No 4-card outside major.

Now count your tricks:

Count the number of winners you should receive from the honors in your hand and the number of cards over 3 in any suit

Examples:

1. ♠KQJ9754 4. ♠987 ♥765 ♦4 ♦K74 ♣32 ♠KJ97653 6 tricks 5 tricks 2. ♠8 5. ♠KQJ9762

Open 1♠

♦3

♣3

- 2. ♠8 ▼AQ87642 ◆Q542 ♣2 7 tricks
- 3. **♦**9 **♥**76 **♦**QJ9876 **♣**J987 5 tricks

Vulnerability ("Rule of 2, 3 and 4")

If your side is vulnerable and the opponents are not, then you

can open the preempt missing 2 tricks.

Open at the 3-level if you have 7 tricks. Open at the 4-level if you have 8 tricks.

If both sides have equal vulnerability, then you can open the preempt missing 3 tricks.

Open at the 3-level if you have 6 tricks. Open at the 4-level if you have 7 tricks.

If your side is not vulnerable and the opponents are, then you can open the preempt missing 4 tricks.

Open at the 3-level if you have 5 tricks. Open at the 4-level if you have 6 tricks.

Responses


Since the preempt bid shows a weak hand, the responder will usually pass. But if the responder has a better than an opening hand and a strong 5-card suit, he can bid at the 3-level. This bid is forcing! The opener will either raise the partner's suit if he has support or repeat the preempt.

Examples:

With this hand, East responds
with his spade suit. If West has
East West North East South
♠AQ9754 3♣ Pass 3♠
▼A65
♦4
♠K32

3 spades, then he would rebid 4♠ otherwise he would repeat clubs, 4♣

Clearly East wants to be in a major, instead of diamonds. He



bids 3♠ then will bid 4♥ to give his partner a choice.

But be careful! Always check the vulnerability. If partner opened on favorable vulnerability, then he will probably opened light. Have more than an opener if you decide to respond.



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






















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
