Possibilities Imagined Can Now Be Realized (Thank You, Ocean Reef!)

Richard Weinstein, president and COO of the Ocean Reef Community Foundation (ORCF), recently shared that as a result of this season's All Charities Weekend, "the generosity of the Members helped to enable distributions to the not-for-profit recipient partners at Ocean Reef [Medical Center, Cultural Center, Academy, Art League, ORCAT and Conservation Association] and to organizations off The Reef in excess of any past annual distributions."

That means that, thanks to additional direct donations to ORCF's Community Grants Fund, for the second year in a row, ORCF will once again be able to distribute record-breaking funds in excess of \$2,000,000 via grants to organizations in the surrounding communities beyond Ocean Reef. In fact, Yuri Mikolay, ORCF's executive director, confirmed that the Foundation will be able to make its largest Community Grants distribution to more organizations in Florida City, Homestead, and in the Upper Keys than ever. In addition, the monies will further enhance the Foundation's Impact Fund, instrumental in assisting such projects as Baptist Health's helipad, programs at the

From Slaughterhouse to Sanctuary: Blossom's Renewal at Ocean Reef Club

During the past summer, our lives changed profoundly when we rescued Blossom, a Tibetan Terrier, from a slaughterhouse in China. Through the efforts of the "No Dogs Left Behind" rescue organization, renowned for its tireless work in rescuing dogs from the illegal dog-meat trade in Asia, we were able to bring Blossom into our family.

My husband and I have

always had a soft spot for animals, often visiting shelters to spend time walking dogs in need of exercise. Little did we know that during our visit to Montauk, we would encounter Blossom and immediately feel a deep connection with her. Learning about Blossom's harrowing journey of survival only strengthened our resolve to provide her with a fresh start.

Originally from a suburb in Zhongnanhai, China,



Blossom was kidnapped, then abandoned by her kidnappers. Found wandering the streets, she was sent to a local slaughterhouse for "processing." Fortunately, Blossom was one of the lucky ones, as she was smuggled out by "No Dogs Left Behind" and placed in a safe shelter.

However, Blossom's journey to safety was fraught with challenges. In 2021, floods in China washed away the shelter where she was staying. Miraculously, she survived and was transferred to another shelter. It still took two years and considerable fundraising for her to find a place, with 50 other dogs, on a pallet that was flown 29 hours from Beijing to New York, where we would meet her. Not all the dogs survived the journey. This was followed by another eight-hour trip to a rescue farm in Canton, New York.

Upon agreeing to foster and eventually adopt Blossom, we welcomed her into our home with open arms, despite evidence of significant trauma. Our vet revealed that Blossom required extensive medical attention, including vaccinations, dental surgery, and grooming. She had already lost 10 teeth and required surgery to remove 14 more.

Despite our best efforts to provide a safe and loving environment, Blossom struggled to adjust. She exhibited signs of fear and mistrust, likely stemming from her traumatic past. Communication proved challenging as she only understood Chinese, adding another layer of complexity to her integration into our daily lives.

Those challenges took a heartbreaking turn when she pulled away from us on her leash, disappearing into the bustling streets of New York City. Desperate to find her, we combed Central Park tirelessly, plastering the area with posters in hopes of her safe return. Luckily, a dog walker spotted Blossom the following morning, prompting us to resume our search. After hours of scouring the park, we were reunited with Blossom. who emerged from the bushes, hesitant and timid.

Here at Ocean Reef, with the dedicated attention of **Grayvik Animal Care Center** staff, along with the solace and companionship she found in the **ORCA Dog Park**, Blossom has undergone a remarkable transformation. Initially timid and withdrawn, she now engages with other dogs, showcasing a remarkable progress that fills us with joy. Witnessing her bark for the first time, a sound we feared she may never make due to the common practice of cutting vocal cords in slaughterhouses, was an unforgettable moment of triumph.

Grayvik's expertise and the nurturing environment of the Dog Park have truly worked wonders for Blossom, making it her special sanctuary where she thrives. With each passing day, she continues to thrive, surrounded by love and care in her new home at Ocean Reef, a testament to her resilience and newfound sense of security.



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Cracking the Coconut Case

These happy nuts popped up in trees, on house patios, public walkways, in planters, and outside retail stores. Despite published pleas for the artist(s) to make themselves known so they could be thanked for these gifts given in an uncertain time, their silence brought intrigue.

Reef sleuths everywhere looked for clues. It became the fodder of gossip, accusation, and inuendo. Surveillance footage taken from Wynn's revealed hoodie-wearing figures dropping off coconuts in the middle of the night to welcome Members and Associates in for their morning shopping. Rumors began circulating that at least two open garage doors revealed stacks of coconuts waiting to be painted in homes on South Harbor Drive. But no one was ever identified.

When the Coconuts began to deteriorate, the sneaky painter(s) would come around and swap them out with fresh faces and themes. Whether it was Halloween, Christmas, or Valentine's Day, you could reliably count on a burst of happiness in the most unusual places-on street signs, on lawns, and on bathroom counters. The coconuts became so popular, that a few people began collecting them in their carts to bring back to their homes rather than leave them out for the community to share. This brought outrage and public calls for decency from some Reefers who loved sighting

these colorful creations. Some eagle-eyed Reefers even noticed that there might even be a Copy-Nut artist or two around as some of the faces looked angrier than others. We discovered there are actually several Coconut Rembrandt forgers in our midst.

As the 2023-2024 season winds down, we decided it was time to bring some closure to the curious.

With some genealogy testing, witness interviews, lie detectors, and DNA samples, we cracked the case. Uh, actually, that's complete hyperbole based on our personal obsession with Dateline NBC's Keith Morrison. There was no high tech or cheek swabbing involved in our detective work, just a little persistence and a few phone calls.

We spoke with the original Coconut creator(s) last week and discussed the purpose of this project, how it got started and, what they were up to now. Out of respect for their generosity and their wish to remain anonymous, we will continue to keep their identity(ies) secret (so sorry), but we will shed some light on the project by sharing some of the highlights of our interview.

Q: Why did you come up with this plan and how do you come up with their characters?

A: During Covid, so many people were suffering. We wanted to bring some hope and happiness to people. We just look at each coconut and ask them who they are to come up with our ideas.

O: How long does it take to create each coconut? Are you still doing them?

A: It takes about 40 minutes each. We made hundreds the first few years, but we haven't done any this past season. We are now leaving painted love rocks. We can make a hundred of them an hour. Our love-theme rocks are

based on The Beatles song All You Need is Love and lyrics Love is All You Need.

Q: Are you responsible for all of the painted coconuts?

A: No, but it was so wonderful to see other people joining in to make other people happy during a difficult time.

O: How did you manage to get some of the nuts high into the trees without being seen?

A: We didn't. We put them out and then other people would move them around.

Q: Are coconuts a fruit or a nut? A: Fruit.

Q: Don't you want people to know who you are?


A: Remaining anonymous is intentional. Like the adage says, Blessed Are Those Who Plant Trees Under Whose Shade He Will Never Sit.

Q: Do you get upset when you hear stories about people taking the coconuts for themselves?

A: No. We figure they needed it. They needed something to bring them joy. But if someone is taking them just to take it, now that's wrong.

Q: Have you ever been caught?

A: Yes, there are a few people who know who we are. But they've all remained tight-lipped understanding that the point is not who is making them, but bringing people joy.

In addition to these distributions, the Community Foundation will provide the final installment of \$300,000 to the Chapel as part of a one-million-dollar three-year commitment to their new Fellowship Center. An additional \$700,000 has been reserved from the All Charities proceeds for impact projects in our surrounding communities. Previous Impact Fund projects have included the Baptist Helipad and the Upper Keys Campus for the College of the Florida Keys.



Rosemary Gibson, Senior Advisor at the Hastings Center and author of China Rx: Exposing the Risks of America's Dependence on China for Medicine, will discuss the dramatic shift in where prescription drugs and overthe-counter products are made. She will show how this shift has given rise to unprecedented shortages of blood pressure medicines, amoxicillin, cancer treatments, and hundreds more.

With most generic drugs made in Asia now, evidence of poorly manufactured medicines will be presented. For example, Cleveland Clinic cardiologists published test results that revealed safety concerns with certain manufacturers' generics for seriously ill cardiac patients. Also, quality and safety data will be presented on generics for underactive thyroid, seizures, and depression.

Where is the FDA? The role


a cantor, donned a prayer shawl and softly sang a prayer of peace while the musicians played with very solemn faces touching every soul present.







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Easter - Of First Importance

Before Easter became a religious observance, it was an historical event. Sometimes the religious trappings can obscure the significance of the event. What took place early on that Sunday morning in Jerusalem, over two millennia ago, needs to be given thoughtful consideration today.

Two Indisputable Facts

Reliable historians agree that there are two indisputable facts about that first Easter morning. The first fact is the tomb in which Jesus of Nazareth was buried late on Friday afternoon, was empty early on Sunday morning.

The body of Jesus had been taken down from the cross by two courageous Jewish religious leaders. The first was Joseph of Arimathea, the wealthy individual to whom the tomb belonged. The other was Nicodemus, a respected teacher in Israel. These two hurriedly wrapped Jesus' body in linen strips, complete with face covering, and laid it on the stone shelf on one side of what would have been a large cave-like tomb.

According to the Gospel accounts, at first light on Sunday, a small group of women made their way to the tomb. They were weighed down with burial spices. They hoped to complete the burial practices the press of time prohibited on Friday because of the beginning of the Jewish Sabbath.

On Friday, a stone had been rolled across the entrance to the tomb and securely sealed. The women worried how they could remove it to gain access

to Jesus' body. Yet upon arriving, they were shocked to find the stone had been rolled away.

What they discovered leads to the second indisputable fact. The body of Jesus was missing. It was not there.

In the patriarchal culture of the first century, women were not permitted to be witnesses in any official matter. Yet in the Gospel accounts, it is women who first announced the news to Jesus' followers. And they were all perplexed.

The Inescapable Conclusion

The Gospels make it clear that Jesus had previously told his followers what was going to happen to him in Jerusalem. He told them, "... the chief priests and teachers of the law will condemn me to death and will hand me over to the Gentiles (the Romans) to be mocked and flogged and crucified." Yet he also told them he will be raised to life on the third day!

His crucifixion and death left his followers totally disheartened and confused. One small group put it this way. "...we had hoped that he was the one who was going to redeem Israel." Their hopes had been dashed.

Yet there were rumors of something remarkable having taken place. It was said, "And what is more, it is the third day since all this took place. Some of our women amazed us. They went to the tomb early this morning but didn't find his body. They came and told us he was alive. Then some of our companions went to the tomb and found it just as the women had said, but him they did not see."

What is clear is this. His followers could barely fathom Jesus' talk of crucifixion and death. But talk of resurrection was beyond their comprehension. As devout Jewish people, that had a penumbral hint or hope of life beyond death. But the notion that a dead man would come back to life after crucifixion —

was unconceivable!

What changed that? It was a matter of a mounting body of evidence that occurred over the following weeks, but started with the empty tomb on that first Easter morning.

Many alternate theories have come forward to explain away the claim of Jesus' bodily resurrection. Some say the body was stolen. Others suggest the women were confused and went to the wrong tomb. Some have claimed his followers were so distraught that they compensated by imagining his resurrection. A few dared to say he didn't really die but was revived by the cool of the tomb. Others say the spirit of his life and teaching lives on while denying any claim for a bodily resurrection.


Yet when each objection is considered in the light of the mounting evidence, eyewitness testimony, and changed lives, there is only one explanation that makes sense of it all. That explanation has been the Easter confession of people of faith ever since. It is this. He is risen! He is risen indeed!

Insurmountable Hope

If true, it is the matter of first importance. God's raising Jesus from the grave and death destroys the power of death, threatens the despotic dominance of tyrants, holds the promise of ultimate justice, offers forgiveness of sins, and breaks the grip of evil's destructive influence. There is no other claim comparable in human history.

Join us this **Sunday** for the Easter Sunrise Service at **7 a.m.** on Buccaneer Island, and at **10 a.m.** in the Ocean Reef Chapel and Fellowship Center, as we celebrate this great hope in song and word.

bloodless techniques, which are important treatment options for cancer patients who choose to receive non-blood medical care for religious, personal, medical or ethical reasons.

She is actively involved in several clinical trials to improve the outcomes of patients with lymphoma. Dr. Linhares has extensive teaching experience training medical students, residents and oncology fellows at UCLA School of Medicine. She serves as an editorial reviewer for prestigious peerreviewed scientific publications, is widely published in numerous medical journals and delivers invited lectures at academic symposiums.

Recently, I sat down with Airport Director Erika Torres to talk about the annual Aviation Day coming up. While I learned all about the fun activities and interesting speakers that will grace the Ocean Reef Airport tarmac on **April 6** (see below for more details), I gained even more than I expected, realizing just how much there is to learn about the history of our Airport!

Airport History

- In 1956 the original Airport was located on what is now the back 9 of Card Sound Golf Club.
- The 1960s is when the growth of private aviation here at Ocean Reef really began.
- The first terminal in 1968 was a tiki hut and there was a



commuter plane to Miami.

• The original airstrip was 2,000-feet long and now is 4,456-feet long and 70-feet wide.

Interesting Facts & Figures:

- Over 102 different types of aircraft are serviced every year, from helicopters to jets, prop planes and more.
- 52% of all aircraft that fly into Ocean Reef are privately

owned and operated.

- The AOPA (Aircraft Owners Pilot Association) makes various videos available for pilots on safety, decision making and landing without a control tower.
- The Ocean Reef Airport has given exclusive access to VIPs including three Presidents, innumerable Cultural Center performers and medical airlifts.
- Only 20 "noise" events (jets taking off or landing) are allowed on standard days.
- A helicopter is permitted to operate two trips in one day.
- All planes must have a landing reservation booking. Equity Members can reserve a year ahead, Social Members 30 days ahead, and Guests seven days.

"The Airport is not just for those Members who fly frequently," commented Erika. "We encourage children to stop by with aviation questions and listen to the walkie-talkies between pilots and ground crew. One visiting grandchild came so often that he is now 16 and set on being a pilot. Nowhere else that I know of can you sit so close to a runway while enjoying a snack and be part of the world of aviation."

She also recalled a comment by a Member whose feeling mirrors many others, "I always know when I am close to Ocean Reef. I can see the turquoise water and know after landing I can hop onto my golf cart and be home within minutes."

Bermants' Marine Love Affair Includes Humpbacks, Hosting Alaskan Research

One of the many things I love about Ocean Reef is the amazing people you meet here. The talents and interests of our community are diverse and fascinating and this applies unreservedly to **Don** and **Denise Bermant**. They share a love of marine life that brought them together as a couple over 40 years ago and has continued to be a passion for them both.

The Early Years

The Bermants bought their first boat in 2010, the first of their three Fleming yachts, and cruised continuously. They traveled from Maine to southern Cuba, spent nine years exploring the remote out-islands of the Bahamas and four years doing the same in British Columbia and southeast Alaska. They found Ocean Reef in 2014 and made it their home port. Married 34 years, they met on a scuba diving trip when Denise was a PADI (Professional Association of Diving Instructors). Denise has always had an amateur interest in marine biology but here at Ocean Reef most know her as a gifted artist and beautiful vocalist who performs with the Oceanaires. Don is a plant biologist who loves golf, pickleball, underwater photography and drone videography. Their years on their boat were spent diving and exploring while Don perfected his underwater photography skills. It was this vast experience in life at sea that made them ideal candidates to become involved with the International SeaKeepers Society, which promotes oceanographic research, conservation, and education through direct involvement of

volunteer "citizen scientists." In 2017, SeaKeepers gave the Bermants a two-month underwater photography assignment that helped them secure permission from the US government to take their boat and explore the coast of Cuba. After this, they volunteered for the Discovery Yacht Program, where private boats are matched with research projects.

Alaskan Adventures

Three years ago, Don and Denise moved their Fleming 65' Blue Pearl to the northwest Pacific where they were paired with the mission of recording whale communications in the Chatham Strait area of southeast Alaska. This summer will be their third season hosting a team of scientists. The scientists live aboard for 14 days or more with the Bermants providing the transportation and hospitality. But their involvement with the research goes far beyond being gracious hosts. Denise explains, "Our most vital contribution is providing the boat without which they could not do the research. Don aids the research through his photography and piloting a drone for aerial photos. Each day we search out a group of

humpback whales and spend the day recording their vocalizations and surface behaviors." Denise and Don are the sole captain/crew and both work together in piloting the boat, finding a protected place to anchor, preparing meals, maintaining the boat, and studying the weather and tides to plot the next day's navigation. Meanwhile, the scientists do their logs and download the day's data. "Having a physicist, mathematician, whale behaviorist, acoustic engineer and musicologist on board leads to some fascinating after-dinner conversations," Denise added. The scientists use a hydrophone (and a mass of complicated equipment) for their humpback whale acoustic research. The ultimate purpose of the research is to decode their language, which may provide data for mathematical models to aid in interpreting other non-human communication.

Another aspect of the research aboard the *Blue Pearl* is to observe and record whale behaviors. They are especially looking for groups of whales in a cooperative hunting strategy that occurs within a group where the whales dive deep below schools of fish and use bubbles blown from their blowholes to

corral fish into a compact school. Denise elaborated, "One whale is the leader and blows the bubbles while the others swim in a circle surrounding the fish. The whales swim in a tightening spiral pattern to keep the fish trapped. On a vocal signal, the entire group lunges to the surface to scoop up the fish in their huge mouths." From Don's photographs, it looks like a sort of whale ballet, but with a very practical purpose. Don captured a "first" on drone video: after a day of cooperative feeding, a group of eight humpback whales breached simultaneously, leaping into the air in what is thought to be an end of the day ceremony before going their separate ways for the night.

So, what motivates these two talented Ocean Reefers to keep seeking new adventures in their golden years? The Bermants agree it is a combination of "the awe-inspiring beauty, the challenges, the new and deepening friendships, and the delight of discovery about planet earth." Or as Dory, who tried some communication with whales in Finding Nemo, would put it, "Just keep swimming, just keep swimming!"



It Takes a Village To Protect Our Reefs

The beauty of nature is lost on no one. To protect the beauty in our backyard coral system, it takes science, knowledge and collaboration. In the words of the great Jacques Cousteau, "We only protect what we love, we only love what we understand, and we only understand what we are taught."

The Dive Shop will be working with Ken Nedimyer - founder of Coral Restoration Foundation and more recently Reef Renewal USA (RRUSA) and his team to develop and implement a comprehensive reef restoration program at Carysfort Reef, beginning at South Carysfort this year and eventually expanding to North Carysfort in years to come. Last year the water temperatures throughout the Keys reached new and unprecedented record highs, killing or bleaching untold numbers of corals, and fundamentally altering the ecology of the Florida Keys. As a result of these losses, and in preparation for more record-breaking summer heat, a new restoration strategy was developed to address the

changing conditions.

In a five-phase plan, we will shift our focus away from the Staghorn and Elkhorn corals and focus more on brain and star corals, which are showing impressive tolerance to heat. We will not completely ignore Staghorn and Elkhorn coral, but will spend more time working with partners around the state to breed and develop new genetic strains of heat resistant corals.

The Dive Shop has offered both passive and active trips to the initial RRUSA Pop Up nursery. In a recent Dive Shop customer survey, the number one program request was Coral Restoration and Nursery Care. We are listening to our customers and expanding programs to train, provide access, clean, fragment, outplant and maintain the Reef Renewal corals exclusively for the participation of ORC members and their guests.

On **April 8th**, The Dive Shop (ORC) and Watson Luxury Properties

at Ocean Reef will host an exciting presentation with Ken and world-renowned Emmy-winning underwater videographer Frazier Nivens (Ocean Imaging Productions) at the Cultural Center theatre at **4:30 p.m.** Ken will be the Keynote Speaker and will lead the audience in an educational journey of coral reef restoration and the development of his 5-phase plan of coral restoration here at Carysfort and beyond entitled

"Coral Restoration Challenges: What is Next?". Frazier will be showing his "An Ocean of Secrets" video filled with some of his best lifetime work, as well as two recent underwater shoots of South Carysfort and some historical footage of the reef in "Diving Carysfort". Special thanks to Ocean Reef Member, **Shelly Cameron Poulton** for helping to make this video possible.

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Easter Bunny – Origin

Holiday symbols, like that of the Easter Bunny, are ingenious amalgams of ancient beliefs. Let's begin with the word "Easter" – the Saxon pagan goddess of spring and dawn was named Eostre or Eastre. Her name may have referred to East, dawn. (She dates back to - well, way back). So, we have a derivation of the word "Easter". What about "Bunny"? In ancient times it was believed widely the hare (rabbit) could reproduce without loss of virginity. This belief later led to the hare's association with the Virgin Mary as seen in medieval paintings. To early German Protestants,

the Easter Hare played the role of judge, much like Santa Claus, rewarding good little children with eggs and candy or gifts at Easter. OK, what about the colored eggs? 



The Shedd Aquarium Team Visits The Academy at Ocean Reef

Following a recent conversation with ORC Member Joan Conley, The Academy was delighted to welcome the Shedd Aquarium team from Chicago, IL. Equipped with a mission to spark compassion, curiosity, and conservation for the aquatic animal world, our Shedd Aquarium educational representatives visited with our Academy K-3 students to engage them in an exciting and tactile-friendly lesson and activity related to coral reefs.

Not to be outdone, our Academy 4-8th graders reveled in the opportunity to visit and get a tour of the Shedd Aquarium's research vessel, Coral Reef II. Coral Reef II serves as a mobile basecamp and laboratory that allows scientists to conduct applied research on animals such as conch, lobster, coral, and sharks. This work helps inform the conservation and management of these

imperiled species. Academy students met the crew---a knowledgeable and passionate group--and learned about the marine research conducted from the boat, the equipment and techniques used, and what it is like to live aboard a research vessel for weeks at a time!

Following a reflection exercise with our students, here are some of their takeaways:

Constantin Wiegand (G6): We learned a lot about coral restoration and climate change. They are trying to find more heat-resistant corals. We also learned about fish and sharks when we were at the Coral Reef II. We got to see the engine room, which was really hot, and the wheelhouse was amazing.

Kai Howell (G6): I enjoyed going into the crew mess where there was air conditioning, a couch, snacks, a TV and everything was overall very cozy.

Edward Brown (G7):

We toured the Coral Reef II, which is a research vessel. It is used to find and plant the coral that can sustain higher temperatures than others. The research vessel crew also finds where endangered or protected species travel throughout the year.

Natalie Blackburn (G7): We were greeted by Chuck Knapp. The classes broke into groups of three. Me, Valerie, Edward and Constantine met Ross Cunning, who taught

us about coral bleaching and the disastrous effect hot water temperatures last summer had on the coral. After Mark Schick gave us a boat tour, we had a great time and learned so much!

Valerie Gabriel (G8): The Shedd Aquarium field trip was so fun and interesting. I learned a lot about marine biology and what life is like on a research boat. We received a tour of the research boat and had the opportunity to see all the different gadgets used on this huge vessel. We learned about coral bleaching, which is a major crisis all over the world. We got to see the engine room and experience the heat that crewmen had to deal with while working in the engine room.



USCG AUXILIARY

Boating Safety

We are almost nearing the end of the season here at ORC and it's a great time to review some boating safety tips, which you can continue to use on your boats this summer!

1) Always check the weather before going out. Here in South Florida, it's not unusual to get a late afternoon "spritz" shower, but we can also get a weather front change during the day that causes high gusty winds and rain. Likewise when

you're out on the water and clouds start to develop, that's probably a good time to raise the anchor and head home. With the large number of live weather and radar apps available, knowing what to expect ahead of time is an easy task.

- 2) The USCG Auxiliary always recommends making a float plan, which is a written plan of where you intend to take your boat that day. If this is not possible, at least let someone know where you'll be that day, bayside or out at Carysfort, so if you do not return, we have an idea of where to start to look.
- 3) Do some "nice day drills" as I call them. For example, when you're anchored on a sunny, flat calm day, get in the water and see if your friend/husband/

wife can pull you into the boat to simulate a man overboard. Are you coming in on the swim platform, gunwale, do you have a life sling to assist? Also can you give your location? Take time to look at the GPS or radio to figure out your lat/long.

- 4) Check your life jackets and see if you have the right size and number for all onboard. Federal and state law mandates one jacket for every person onboard, and they must be the appropriate size. An adult jacket is not suitable or legal for a child.
- 5) Take a boating course. Our flotilla offers Emergency Boating Courses as well as FL State boating courses. Check the Ocean Reef Press for dates, etc.
- 6) Have one of our

flotilla members perform a vessel safety check on your boat. This is a checklist of equipment that is recommended for your boat and can keep you current with flares, fire extinguishers, life jackets, etc. It's not a punitive exam; we are here to help you and promote boating safety!

7) Finally, an EPIRB for your boat and/or a personal EPIRB for your personal life jacket are especially important if you venture offshore or to the Bahamas. This device uses a satellite transmission and lets the Coast Guard know where you are in the event of an emergency. The capability of these devices has dramatically been upgraded the past few years, and the cost has become very reasonable.

The level of play should be exceptional and not to be missed. Join the tradition of the Bag Room Open and support the quality golf personnel we enjoy at Ocean Reef.



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

How to Fix Your Short Game

Ahhhh the dreaded chip shot....
How many times have we hit this shot thin over the green or chunky and the ball has gone nowhere?
This week, we are going to help you get rid of the dreaded part of chipping and begin to love hitting these shots around the green!

Weight Distribution

On all chips and pitches, we should have our weight on our front foot. What this allows is for us to be swinging the club down and through the golf ball and not swinging up into the ball. Contact in the short game is the most important piece of the puzzle and

when you create great contact, you can control your shots more easily.

How does the chipping motion look?

When you set up a chip shot, you are looking to have your arms and club form a "Y" to the golf ball.
With your weight on your forward foot and the ball in the middle of your stance, your goal is to move the shoulders or chest to make the ball fly in its desired direction.
When we make this motion, our chest should continue to rotate toward the target on the way through the golf ball.

Drills

When you set up you should have your right foot slightly behind you and your right heel up off the ground. This will promote your weight moving toward your front foot as you continue to strike down on the golf ball and generate great contact.

The Singles Club Championship Finals will take place on **Saturday**, **April 13th** and all are encouraged to come and watch some phenomenal Championship Singles



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How to Improve **Your Serving** Percentage:



Tennis Tip" by Hannah Fleckenstein, Head Tennis Professional

When people come to me for a serving lesson, I often work on how the player should swing their rackets, how they should grip their rackets, and how they should hit the ball. Once people are comfortable with these processes, I incorporate finer details that take them from "I hope I just get the ball in the box" to "I am going to hit this serve deep in the corner of the box over the returner head." This week I thought I would share three of these details so that we

can all go out and practice our serve with some new focus points.

- 1. Footing: When you are serving, think and feel what your feet are doing. Do they stay on the ground while you toss the ball? Do you pick them up and move them? Ideally, as you serve your weight should shift from your front foot to your back foot and back to your front foot again. As you start your serve, your weight is on the front foot. As your hands go up to toss the ball, your weight shifts from the front foot to the back foot, and as your hands get set to hit the ball your weight shifts back into your front foot so that you can load and jump up to hit the ball.
- 2. Balance: What happens when your hands go above your head to hit? If you find yourself falling over, practice serving without the ball and see if you can hold your finishing position for two seconds. If you can do this, add the ball and see at one point you lose your balance in your serve. Nine times out of

ten, your toss will throw you off balance as you try and chase it down. The toss is the crux of the serve. If it is not the right one, do not hit it. In general, your toss should lead you forward into the court. If you have trouble with an inconsistent ball toss, look to keep the toss in front of you so that you can always see the ball.

3. Repetition: The best way to get better at the serve is to go out and practice! The next time you have nothing to do come on over to the Tennis & Games Center and hit a bucket of serves. Give thought to every serve you hit, but do not stress about the mechanics of the motion. Rather, think about where you want to put the serve. Go out and serve 10 first serves, then 10 second serves, then 10 first serve/second serve combinations. Getting better at the serve takes time and practice. Have fun with it!

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

BRIDGE TIP OF THE WEEK

Ambiguous Splinters

In the intricate game of bridge, strategic bidding can often reveal hidden depths in your partnership's hand. One such tactic, known as "ambiguous splinters," adds a layer of complexity to the bidding process.

Imagine you're the responder after your partner's 1♥ opening bid. Holding a strong hand with support for hearts, you opt for a game-forcing raise by bidding 3♥. Your partner's unexpected rebid of 3♠ indicates an unbalanced hand with a singleton or void in spades, signaling game interest and potentially hinting at slam.

Now it's your turn to respond.

If your partner has a minimum hand and no slam aspirations, they'll likely settle in 4. However, if the prospect of slam intrigues them, they might employ a clever tactic: the bid of 3NT as a relay.

This bid serves as an artificial inquiry, prompting you to reveal your short suit. It's a strategic move aimed at keeping opponents guessing and limiting their insight into your partnership's hand.

The relay works as follows:

- A bid of 4. indicates a club singleton or void.
- 4♦ reveals a diamond singleton or void.
- And 4♥ signifies a heart singleton or void.

By mastering the art of ambiguous splinters, you can enhance your partnership's bidding repertoire and elevate your game to new levels of sophistication.


